Airborne TV Advantages High

Another advantage is that it provides resourses otherwise unavailable for the schools. In the broadcast on house building the studio teacher gave her talk from houses in various stages of completion. The television camera focused on each part of the house that she discussed and two contractors were there to help her discuss the building process and materials used.

It offers a wealth of new ideas to the classroom teacher to better her teaching program. Television presents a great deal of information to many students simultaneously. It magnifies demonstrations allowing every aspect of, for example, the dissection of a frog in Biology class.

Television provides a basic minimum framework for all sutdents without limiting the exceptional ones, regardless of the competence of the classroom teacher. Finally, in the future it

will allow students to share the activities of other students This will be accomplished through the televising of student plays, concerts, and special projects.

The educational telecasts, like their commercial counterparts, are broadcast in thirty minute blocks of time. This presents two problems of schedualing. First, the telecasts must be timed to fit the scheduals of most schools Also, there is some difficulty in fitting these thirty minute telecasts into class periods of various lengths.

There is the problem. especially on the college level, of interesting the very best teachers. Since the programs can transmit the bad and mediocre as far as the superior, there is the problem of obtaining and using only the superior teachers.

classroomteacher mustwork together as a team, yet the role of each is not yet fully defined. Another problem is that the schools are not designed for television,

Finally, there is the problem of how to deal with individual student differences. So far this phase has been left almost entirely up to the classroom teacher.

Although these problems do exist, certainly it can be said at this point that the advantages outweigh them. As a superior classroom aid, television is being successfully adopted by more and more schools. Perhaps one day it will be as conventional as textbooks.
