## Workshop Opens Fund Drive

## Debt Rapidly Being Liquidated

Dan Boutell, School Board Treasurer, reported many spects of the School's financial condition to Manchestcitizens at Monday evening's meeting.

Mr. Boutell reported that of the Nine Hundred Thousand borrowed for School Building Construction during ne last ten years, Five Hundred Thousand has already een paid, leaving a balance to be collected of Four lundred Thousand Dollars.

He stated that the Pleasant Lake School would be paid or this next year. A collection of something less than hree mills for the next five years would pay for the Tigh School. Taxpayers would have about nine years at ess than two mills to pay for the Nellie Ackerson

Mr. Boutell reported that the operation budget picture not as satisfactory. With our extra millage we gaind nothing on the deficit during this last year. He also tated that next year's budget is not expected to improve he deficit. This practice of a constant yearly deficit, e stated, is of great concern to the Board as the Deroit Banks question the legality of loaning operating oney to schools who carry a deficit. Mr. Buttell statd that if our level of income is not improved the board as no choice but to cut maintenance and capital outlay nd at the same time increase the teacher-pupil ratio. e stated that at the present time the budget for capoutlay and maintenance are embarrassingly low. Mr. Boutell thought that the citizens should consider

eplacing the Pleasant Lake Debt Retirement Tax with equivalent Building and Site Millage earmarked for improvement of school libraries and facilities so rongly recommended by last year's Study Committee. Mr. Boutell stated some comparisons of the Manches-District to the other five hundred thirty six districts the state that he had compiled from 1960 State Deertment reports. At this time he stated there were 297 hools larger than our local school.

There were 267 schools collecting more operating illage and total millage.

There were ninety school districts with a better valution per child than the local district. He stated that the icture has changed as the school enrollment has inreased locally and the valuation has decreased. Mr. Boutell strongly recommended that area citizens avolve themselves more than ever before in the future oblems with school finance.

#### ducation is an Investment

In an informal talk presented to the area citizens Monlay evening Superintendent Masten stated there is is some proof now that education is a sound financial

He stated that a recent study of government spending n Veteran's Education has proved to increase income of these service men to the point that the increased Federal Income Tax, because of this training, shows a yearly 10 per cent return on increased federal taxes. He states that because of this advanced training and igher income there would be a return also reasized on more property tax locally and more sales tax on a

regional basis. Mr. Masten states that better instruction facilities, programing on the local level will produce adults better abl e to face adult responsibilities. In turn, these people should be in a better position to earn money, own property and pay taxes. In this manner the taxpayer can realize a substantial dollar return on their investment in education.

Mr. Masten also reported that several of the less expensive items on last year's report had been completed this year.

The major changes were as follows: 1. The enlarging of the Junior High School Library. 2. The removal of the hall storage room in Junior High School.

3. More integrated teaching in the senior High School. 4. The combination of High School Agriculture

lasses. 5. The addition of a third year of German in High

School. 6. The introduction of Speech into the High School Curriculum.

He reported that many other aspects of the program for improvement of the schools were being investigated Mr. Masten finished his report with some personal recommendations for the consideration of the general public.

He said that no time should be wasted in getting to work on a complete curriculum evaluation. Also he thought that School Board policies should be organized and codified in the near future.







## FARMING.

START PULLETS OFF RIGHT. Once a flock has developed a habit of laying on the floor it is difficult to correct the situation. Many politrymen report fewer initial floor eggs if they house pullets late—between 10% and 20% production. The idea is that the pullets go directly to the nests instead of a dark corner to lay. Use artificial eggs ta attract pullets to the nest. Don't overcrowd birds, Locate nests near the floor and space nests oblirds won't have a long discount. nests so birds won't have a long distance to travel.

SOYBEAN PRICE MOVEMENT will fare a little better than last year, but prices won't "run away" as they did two years ago. The price basis is the \$2.25 per bushel average loan rate. The government resale price of 19c per bushel over the No. 2 loan will, in effect, put a ceiling on prices. If you have farm storage available, use it. Prices probably won't go much over your county loan rate plus 19c, but they should move up enough for your net return to equal gross loan level.



FEED COSTS make up about three refer COSTS make up about three-fourths of the cost of growing nogs to market weight. It is here that the greatest opportunity lies in reducing costs. You can cut feeding costs by adjusting protein content in the ration according to the weight of hogs fed. From weaning to 75 pounds, feed between 14% and 16% protein; 75 to 150 pounds, reduce protein to around 12% or 14%. From 150 pounds to market weight the hogs will need only 10% to 12%.

IT'S TIME AGAIN to make farm rental agreements for next year. Under the present high capital requirements of modern agriculture, many farmers are revamping their agreements to suit changing farm conditions. In a fair agreement the landowner and tenant divide the income in the same proportion as their costs, including labor
