





Wheat Diverted Acres Open So Livestock

Beginning in November most of the acreage diverted under the 1962 feed grain and wheat programs will be released from prograth restrictions on grazing, Max M. Kalmbach. Chairman, Agricultural St abilization and Conservation County Committee, has announced. The authorization does not extend to 1) diverted acreage on

which grain or oilseed crop has matured in 1962, and (2) diverted acreage which is devoted to wildlife food plots, (3) diverted acreage credited under the double cropping provisions of farm

The chairman explained that the grazing restrictions being relaxed as part of ne general effort to keep rovisions of farm programs n line with practical farmng operations. Many farmers normally salvage dropped corn ears and other crop residue by turning livestock onto harvested cropland in the late fall Since the divertcreage of many farms is not fenced separately, the rogram change will permit hese farmers to salvage his feed without being put to reasonable work time and xpense for protective fenc-The main objective of the

ban against livestock on diverted acres has been to prevent grazing that might partially offset the corn, grain sorghum, and wheat adjustment under the diverion programs. With killing rosts likely in November over the main grain-producng area, the objective, would be satisfactorily met by that time. In addition, the mportant period for protect on of the diverted acreages lso will have passed in most ageas. In the event of a Statewide

FEWER MCHIGAN APPLES THIS YEAR

Michigan's agricultural news states that the apple crop is down 25 per cent from a year ago.

That means fewer apples are available for canning or frozen apple slices, sauces or juices. And. it means a cut in the fruit farmers' income. Apples bring in \$25 million a year to Michigan growers. The demand for fresh

apples is about the same but when the production is down the apples available to processors are down. This year's lower supply has boosted prices to grow-

vear. Sauce manufacturers are paying top prices of \$2.75 per bushel for Northern Spies that are two and onehalf inches in diameter or more. Slice manufacturers are paying top prices too.

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




