cil. Tests show that modern design snow tires can aid starting traction on ice by as much as 28 per cent and this could prevent being stalled.

There are times when even the best snow tires are inadequate and drivers face embarrassment of getting stalled in front of snowplows-or blocking the path of fire trucks or ambulance For full confidence and dependable performance in heavy snow, or on icy, hilly streets, tests have proved that there is noth-

ing to match the ability of reinforced tire chains. Science has tested and found that various tires and traction devices in the order of increasing effectiveness on winter surfaces list them in the following order: Smooth tires (they should not be used), regular tires, winterized tires mud-snow tires, tires with embedded metal coils with serpentine ribds, sanders,

INCOME TAX

FORMS READY R.I.Nixon, Detroit District Director of Internal Revenue Service announced that copies of the 1962 Federal Income Tax Forms will be available at the Detroit Internal Revenue Office and at Michigan's 35 local offices Monday, Dec. 17.

Tax practitioners and other bulk users of tax forms can pick up forms at all offices on December 17 and where mail delivery has been requested, the bulk shipments will be received shortly thereafter.

The release date is two weeks later than normal because of the late adjournment of Congress. Printing of the tax forms could not begin until the middle of October rather than the end of September starting date of 1961. Some of the forms are printed on the same presses that print the toppriority congressional record with the remainder being printed in commercial printing houses throughout the country. Despite the 3 weeks delay in the printing start-up, delivery dates are only two weeks late. There will be no delay in the delivery of forms to in-

CHRISTMAS TREES

Everyone should have a Christmas tree"-that's the strong feeling of tree farmer Calvin Lutz of Kaleva, Michigan. He cuts and markets 4,000 or so Scotch pines, spruce, Norway pine and other assorted varieties. Needy persons who visit his retail lots frequently discover that the price of the tree they want, but can not afford, has suddenly dropped to zero. "But I usually let them pay some-

thing-whatever they can.It helps retain the dignity of the family. As with the two family gar age the modern trend is toward the two-tree family. One tree for the main living portion of the home, another for the children or the fam-

ily room. "Tastes in trees change," he explains, "we have to pro vide about seven varieties to keep up with the demand." He notes a trend toward the short needled sprice varieties as opposed to the longneedled pines. Personally, he much prefers the longer needle tree. "Spruce are

first to lose their needles, followed by the Balsam, and finally the Douglas Fir". Contrary to what many people think, growers must cut pines shortly before the first frost to assure retention of needle color. After a freeze, the sap withdraws and the long needled varieties turn somewhat yellow in appearance. But they hold their needles well regardless of when they are cut.




