Tonight, Manchester will pay homage to the man who put MAN into Manchester, and we are proud of him. Manchester, in the past, has made many attempts to land factories and not until 1940 was the Chamber of Commerce stung by the progressive bee to spur them on. Mr. Herbert Upton and Mr. Finley Riggs, owners of the Double A Products Company of Ann Arbor met with the Chamber of Commerce with a proposition asking us to build a factory 60 x 181 feet which they would buy from us later at a cost of \$15,000. After several meetings, a Committee was appointed to solicit the required amount. The committee appointed were: William Dorrance, F.C. Huber, J.C. Hendley, Charles Waltz, William Kulenkamp, Carl Wuerthner and L.P. Wurster. Several weeks went by and the required amount was raised. The first subscriber was Ed E. Root, Cashier of the Union Savings Bank for \$400, and a total of 81 subscribers completed the list. With the amount raised, the next order of business was to have a building committee which consisted of Chairman J.C.


