

School Board Presents Next Years Budget

The tentative school budget for this next year was presented to the citizens at a meeting in the Nellie Ackerson school last Thursday evening. The budget totals were not too different from those of the last year. More money was slated for instruction, especially teachers salaries.

Dr. Boutell explained that maintenance and capital improvement were cut drastically. The board tried to meet the new teachers salaries without raising the total budget. He also explained that the recommendations from this year's study had not been reflected in the budget.

Dr. Boutell explained that last year's 18,000.00 deficit had not been changed and there were presently no plans to improve this situation next year. The present budget calls for four extra mills as had last years. People will be asked to continue this extra millage for another year in the June 11th election.

It was explained that this budget was only tentative but it was a minimum amount necessary to continue the school as it is.

Other school district obligations were discussed: PLEASANT LAKE SCHOOL, \$20,000 outstanding, this would take less than a mill this year and less than 1/2 a mill the following year to retire the complete issue. HIGH SCHOOL, 181,000.00 outstanding which requires spread of less than three mills for the next five years to retire the complete issue. NELLIE ACKERSON SCHOOL, \$20,000.00 outstanding, this requires approximately 1 3/4 mills for the next nine years for full retirement. SCHOOL BUS NOTES, \$20,000 outstanding, this will be increased as the board must buy four or five buses in the next two years for two small vehicles. SCHOOL INSTRUMENTS, \$20,000 is outstanding on instruments rented to students. It was explained that the present rental system was not paying notes as anticipated. A new rental system will be worked this next year. Copies of the tentative budget will be available in the near future for the general public. The final budget will be adopted until after the school election.
