THE NUMBER OF PIGS FARROWED THIS FALL will depend to a great extent on how you feed your sows during breeding. In college tests, sows fed a high level of antibiotic farrowed 10.4 pigs per litter compared with 9.4 pigs among sows not receiving any. Number of pigs weaned averaged 8.6 and 7.8 in favor of the antibiotic treatment. Feed about one-half gram of aureomycin or terramycin per sow per day for 10 to 21 days at breeding time—one gives about as good results as the other.

SENSE

KEEP HOG SHIPPING LOSSES DOWN. Shrink can vary all the way from 0.5% to 4% in hogs depending on how they are handled. Be especially careful when temperatures climb to 80 degrees and above. Load animals and ship early in the morning where possible. It also helps to put wet sand or crushed ice on the floor of the truck. Make up a full but comfortable load—either over or underloading can increase shrink 15% to 20%.

HAVING TROUBLE ACCOUNTING FOR YOUR GASOLINE CONSUMPTION? Better check the way your fuel is stored if you are. Evaporation losses mount during hot weather unless proper precautions are taken. Locate fuel tanks is checky areas and maint them white to precautions are taken. Locate fuel tanks in shady areas and paint them white to reflect the heat. Another thing-ask your local supplier to provide you with a pressure valve. A valve helps maintain tank pressure at about 2 pounds, there-by stopping evaporation of the more volatile portion of the gasoline.
