MINOR ELEMENTS are a good fertilizer buy, but only if you need them. They aren't recommended by most experiment stations unless you know you have a specific minor element shortage etting high yields, and you think lack of minor elements. Watch results carefully to see if it improves yields. In most cases your extension agent can tell you in advance whether there is likely to be a minor element shortage in your area.

NEW BUILDING? What kind of roof NEW BUILDING? What kind of roof will you put on it? The most widely used roofing material today for farm buildings is galvanized metal. Galvanized means that the metal has been coated with zinc. This protects the base metal from rusting, and adds many years to the life of the roof. However, the zinc will deteriorate after several years and should be painted. In Illinois tests grey metallic zinc paint with a second coat of aluminum paint gave best results. Paint when 5% of base metal shows. FEED EFFICIENCY IS BETTER on high producing livestock. Your best animals may eat the most, but they are paying you back more too. This should be kept in mind when culling out your breeding herd, as well as when selecting new breeding stock.
