USDA ANNOUNCES CORN SUPPORT

United States Department of Agriculture recently announced the 1962-crop corn county minimum price support rates.

These rates are based on the 1962 minimum national average support prices of \$1.20 per bushel. This is the same as the 1961 support price.

The method followed in determining county support price of \$1.20 is the same as in previous years. These support rates in the major producing areas, which include Michigan, are un change from those for the 1961 crop.

These minimum rates will not be be reduced but be increased is the final 1962-crop corn support price determined on the bas is of data on October 1 is higher than the minimum price announced in March.

The price support program for corn will be carried out as in the past through farm and warehouse stored loans nor even readers of this and purchase agreements. The eligible quantity will be based on the farm's established per acre yield, based on the 1959-60 average, times the 1962 corn acreage as determined by the county photographer. agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee . Producers of corn who do

not participate in the 1962 Geed Grain Program will not be eligible for support on 1962 corn production. Further, to be eligible for support, corn must have been produced in 1962. It must grade No.3 or better to be eligible. Corn must meet certain moisture requirements. The corn also

must be adequately stored. County rates in Michigan range from \$1.21 to \$1.24 per bushel. For Washtenaw Cpunty the 1962 rate is \$1.23 per bushel.







CONTROL WEEDS THIS FALL

Control weeds this fall, and let Old Man Winter lend a helping hand.

Farm crops specialist s at Michigan State U niversity report that farmers can control quackgrass by spray ing before mid-October. Yellow rocket and broadleaved winter annuals can be killed by spraying after one or two good frosts.

The specialists, William F Meggit and Milton H. Erdmann, recommend 15 pounds of dalapon per acre to control quackgrass. On corn fields, 2 pounds of amitrole-T for four pounds of atrazine will do the job. Each of these chemicals should be mixed with 30-40 gallons of water per acre and sprayed when the quack grass i s 4-8 inches tall. fall plcw 7 to 10 days after be hel d at the Civic audispraying with dalapon or amitrole-T. 
The F.F.A. called its first meeting to order on September 12, 1952, with the new officers presiding.

Peel onions. Chop sufficient onion finely to make about 1/4 cup. Slice remaining onions. Mix chopped onion, beef, bread crumbs, 1 teaspoon of the salt and evaporated milk together lightly but thoroughly with a fork. Divide mixture and roll lightly into 12 balls about 2 inches in diameter. Roll each ball in flour to coat and set aside. Melt butter in a large skillet that has a tight-fitting cover. Add sliced onions and cook over low heat until transparent, stirring occasionally. Remove onions and save. Add meat balls and brown on all sides over medium heat. Cover meat balls with sliced potatoes and the cooked onions. Pour tomato juice over all, then sprinkle with 1 remaining teaspoon salt and pepper. Cover and cook until potatoes are almost tender, about 15 minutes. Add frozen peas from package, cover and cook 10 minutes longer. Makes 6 servings.
