REEZING WON'T HURT SILAGE, MAY HURT SILOS

Silage commonly freezes during the winter in the northern United States, and there is no type of silo in which silage won't freeze o some extent.

What is the effect of frozen silage on animals, on the silage itself, and on silos? A current Farm Quarterly magazine report says if sattle are fed frozen silage especially in large lumps, they may scour but this is less likely to happen if the gozen silage is chipped and fluffy and mixed with a fair amount of unfrozen
