Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry and fold carefully into batter. Divide batter into 2 greased loaf pans (9x5x4 inches) and bake in slow oven (300°F.) 2^{1_2} hours. 

HIGHWAY M-92 NOW M-52

HIGHWAY M-92 will no longer be on Michigan's state highway map. This change is being made after 42 years.

State Highway Department officials said that a 40-mile section of M-92 in Washtenaw, Lenawee, Jackson and Ingham counties has been redesignated as M-52 to provide continuity in the State's highway numbering

M-52 new starts at the Michigan-Ohio line south of Adrian and extends north through Adrian and Chelsea in Washtenaw County and ends at M-36.

In 1920, a 25-mile section of a county road in Ingham, Jackson and Washtenaw counties was taken over by the State Highway Department and designated as M-92. In 1954, another 15 miles of county roads in Washtena aw and Lenawee counties were taken over by the State Highway Department to extend M-92 to Clinton, according to a report from John C. Mackie, Michigan State Highway commissioner


