SWAINSON RELAX IN CENTURY OLD HOME The inside of the 14 room dwelling was completely gutted and

reconstructed into 11 rooms. Mrs. Swainson, with the help of a lumber company draftsman from Jackson, redesigned the interior without the aid of an architect.

A porch was removed from the exterior and columns added. Arched windows with their beveled glass windows were retained. The house is painted white siding with green shutters.

What was once a summer kitchen at the rear is now a large family room with exterior walls of field stone. "I call it the barn room because some of the wood in the room came from a barn on the property. And too, I like to get away from calling it a rumpus room, or even a family room," Mrs. Swainson said.

Material for the huge split-stone fireplace came from the Swainson farm. The large beam forming the mantlepiece was found on a nearby farm. The two Early American style sofas in the room are covered with

red and white small check and draperies and valances are of deep red burlap with a beige-tinted scroll design above the hems. A custom-built narrow drop leaf coffee table is as long as the sofas. The wainscoating is of lumber from one of the unused buildings on the farm and hand-hewn beams were found in this area. The

new oak flooring is fastened with screws and pegged. A rocking chair in the barn room is a replica of President Kennedy's rocking chair and was a gift from the former governor of North Carolina, Terry Sanford, Mr. Sanford and Judge Swainson attended the University of North Carolina at the same time.



New Stamping Plant To Hold Open House

Three local men who have done a remarkable job in promoting this community in many different fields of service will be given special recognition Saturday evening at an "Appreciation Banquet". Honored will be Eugene Bentschneider, Clarence Fielder and Ted Stautz. The event will tie in with the open house at the new Manchester Stamping Plant, which is one of two which the three men own.

Manchester Stamping Corporation got its start in 1963 when the three bought the business and equipment from Brannock Construction of Brooklyn. Until January of this year, Ted Stautz, president of Manchester Stamping, spent most of his time at the Brooklyn operation while Bentschneider and Fielder worked at the Man chester Tool & Die, which they also own.

The new Stamping Plant was built two miles west of Manchester Tool and Die, across the village to the outskirts at 17951 Austin Road.

Referring to the three men, Ted Roberts, general chairman of the Saturday "Appreciation Banquet" points to the fact that "every civic venture promoted in the village for many years has had at least one of the three on its working committee,"

The banquet is open to the public and will be served by the Knights of Columbus.

Fielder and Stautz are both local boys and graduated in the Class of 1941 from Manchester High School. Bentschneider is the son of the E. L. Bentschneiders and was born in Jackson. He graduated from Napoleon High School in 1941.

The three have diversified interests and possibly this is the reason they enjoy working together. They are all tool and die journeymen and served their apprenticeship with the Ford Motor Company at the former Manchester

Stautz and Fielder entered service on the same day-January 21, 1944. Bentschneider joined the Marine Corps in March 1944. After their term of service they all went back to Ford Motor.

In September 1952 Fielder and Bentschneider left Ford Motor to work at Ratel Television in Grass Lake. It was during that time that the two decided to go in business for themselves. So, keeping their steady jobs they decided to set up shop in Fielder's garage. After their regular work day the two spent many long, hard hours working in their garage shop--while Fielder's car was left in the vard.

During that time Stautz decided that his dish would be "Go West, young man!" He and his brother, Robert, equipped with combines followed the harvest from June through September, from Oklahoma to North Dakota. It was a good experience but Stautz was glad to return to Manchester, where he operated a milk route for six years. le worked part time at Double A Products and finall went to Ratel in Grass Lake, too.

Fielder and Bentschneider outgrew the garage set-up and were looking for a location to put up a building and go in business for themselves.
