

MANCHESTER BARN DESTROYED BY FIRE

A large barn, 75 by 30 feet, 6715 Lamb Road was burned to the around with the help of a walker. Road, E. Lansing. on Mrs. Albert Feldkamp's farm, ground early Friday morning.

Barns located at both ends of the burned barn were saved by the Manchester and Napoleon fire departments after the blaze was discovered by Joseph Kastl, who saw the flames from his house on a nearby farm at 1:10 a.m.

A corn planter, two grain drills, a plow, mowing machine, field cultivator and other tools were lost.

The farm was unoccupied at the time.

The Washtenaw County Sheriff Department in investigating this fire and another mysterious barn fire discovered early enough to be put out before extensive damage was done.

Mrs. Lillian Washburn, discovered a fire in her barn, located only a few miles from the Feldkamp barn, just as she was leaving her home last week Wednesday morning.

Last fall, two other barns burned: One on the unoccupied Seth Mahrle farm and the other on the former Oklahoma Ranch, north of Manchester.






WEAKER HOG SLAUGHTER PRICES WEAKER HOG SLAUGHTER PRICES are expected by the end of March, possibly around \$25. April could see a further weakening. Seasonal decline in shaughter into summer will be smaller than normal this year. Consequently, late spring-summer price gains will also be modest. Fewer hogs than expected have been slaughtered judging by farrowings several months ago. Sow slaughter is down sharply, indicating a holdback for breeding purposes.

SHELTER AND CONCRETE PAVING increased steer gains in Iowa tests.

Sector increased average daily gain .48 pound per yearling steer in winder and .18 pound in summer. Cost of gains with shelter was about \$3.50 per cwt. in winter and \$8c less in summer. Concrete paving saved about 70c per cwt. gained and required only one-third as much labor and machine time for maintenance compared to dirt lots.

\$60VABLE POSTS are handy around farmstead where permanent fences are undesirable. Pour concrete into the old fires in which you've placed a married post. They are handy around mediot bunks where cattle must be inself in separate groups. Others use them to make temporary holding pens and alleyways around farm buildings. Since the posts can be rolled into place it takes but a few minutes to set up a tence or take one down.



GRAIN HEATING may be a serious problem as daily temperatures begin to fise if you still have some in storage. If grain is a little high in moistable and no aeration equipment is used, warm weather will cause it to be a serious pole and make deep checks often.



Two Fatal Accidents Occur Within Half-Mil

operator and a Manchester housewife were killed within a threehour period early Sunday morning in two separate traffic accidents, both on Pleasant Lake Road, less than a mile from each other.

Dead were Wayne A. Ray of 208 Morgan Street, Manchester and Mrs. Judy Ann Navrock, 25 of 418 LaFayette, Manchester. One of the three passengers in Mrs. Navrock's car was hospital-

Sheriff's deputies said Ray was killed at 12:30 a.m. when his speeding car left Pleasant Lake Rd hit two large trees and overturned in the roadway.

Mrs. Navrock died after the car she was driving veered off Pleasant Lake Road, into a farm field at 3:30 a.m. and turned over twice. She was thrown out of the car and landed under it, deputies

Edwin A. Griffith, 31, of 2992 Lake View, Ann Arbor and Gary Langthorne, 25, and his wife, Christine, 23, both of 277 Bent Oak, Adrian, were taken to St. Joseph Mercy Hospital for treatment. Langthorne had two broken collar bones and other injuries. The other two escaped serious in

Deputies said Ray was headed west on Pleasant Lake Road, onehalf mile east of M-52 in Sharon Township at an estimated speed of 85 miles an hour. Officers said Ray lost control of his 1962 mode car on a curve.

The car traveled 15 feet across the road, went 285 feet along the shoulder of the road and then sailed into a deep culvert. The vehicle apparently hit a bump in the culvert and was sent hurling 66 feet through the air and into a large tree, deputies said.



BROTHER' TO RAISE A FEW CHICKENS

The biggest egg production plant in this part of the county will ld open house Saturday, March 26 from 11:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. the Early Bird Farms, Inc. one mile west of Manchester on Austin

This is a far cry from egg production of a few years back when very farmer had a flock of chickens, all the eggs they wanted and me to sell. It was often the money which the farmer's wife reeived from her sale of eggs that bought the groceries which she eeded to complete the family larder. But most of the food was

Now everything is done on a big scale, and for the most part few armers "bother" to raise a few chickens. Like everything else both production of eggs and of chickens has "gone big".

This is pretty obvious at the newest operation in this area, where ony Schlosser and a crew of nine were working long hours to get his eam operation ready for showing Saturday. The weather hasn't een cooperating either. But the chicken man is optimistic and ays that everything will be ready on schedule. And apparently that the way these big operators work. The Schlossers have been raisng chickens for years on their 15 acres, but until now they have ver gone into egg production.

They buy day-old chicks and have three 10,000 bird houses. hese are leghorn type birds--special for egg production. The birds e kept in these concrete buildings with a special ventilating system nev are automatically fed and watered. There are no windows. here is electric lighting for 22 hours a day for these day-old hicks. The light is carefully controlled and by the time they are weeks old the pullets are getting 13.5 hours of light. It takes bout 19 weeks to bring the pullets to production, Schlosser said.

This is the reason for the open house so people can see the newype of laying house on Saturday. The pullets which he has een raising will be ready for their new home at that time. He pinted out that the production and the size of the eggs are concolled by light. The three houses where the birds live for the first 18 or 19 weeks are 50×216 let. with 14 fans to the building.


