## SCHOOL OPERATING **BUDGET FOR 1966-67**

The Manchester Board of Education at ist regular monthly meeting Monday night discussed the first draft of the 1966-67 school budget. The tentative budget as presented Monday night shows an increase of some \$55,000.00 over last year's budget. While the largest single increase in the improvement of the teachers' salary schedule, it was noted that the Manchester salary schedule will still be behind the average minimum salary schedule paid in neighboring districts. Improvements in both the elementary and secondary programs were discussed and a report to the general public relative to these proposed changes will be forthcoming at a later date. In the discussion of the proposed budget Mr. Luther C. Klager, Board President, indicated that all school districts in the State of Michigan are experiencing the same problems and that Manchester must move ahead with the rest of the districts. Mr. Klager said, "We are not an island. There are certain things we must do if we want our boys and girls to be competitive in a highly competitive world." Mr. Klager added, "We might not like these increasing costs, but if we don't face up to them in the area of education our young people will be the ones to suffer.'

Considering the revenues needed to meet the 1966-67 budget, the Board of Education indicated that a minimum of five (5) extra operational mills are necessary in order to achieve a sound financial program. The school district has for several years levied this much millage as extra operational millage. Last year this amount was cut to three mills. However, in the light of the proposed expenditures for next year and in an effort to keep the district financially and educationally competitive, the Board of Education will propose to the patrons of the district a five mill operational levy at the annual June election. At this particular time it is not known what kind of increase, if any, will be forthcoming from the State in the form of State Aid. But regardless of any improvement from this source, the school district will still need at least two additional mills over what was received last year in order to meet the new obligations that are

The Board of Education is planning to hold a meeting for the general public in the very near future. The proposed budget and school needs will be discussed and explained in order that the patrons of the district will be adequately informed. The time and place of this meeting will be announced at a later date.

In other business the Board of Education granted pay raises to all non-certificated personnel. These raises, for the most part, reflected the annual cost of living increase granted to employees. Superintendent Swartz reported that a new language laboratory partially purchased with NDEA funds was being installed in the high school this week. This language laboratory is a portable one and will be installed in the present high school building until the new building is ready to accommodate it.

## MACHESTER SCHOOL DISTRICT TO RECEIVE \$20,258.90

The Manchester School District will receive \$20,258.90 in Federal Funds under the provisions of the Elementary-Secondary Education Act of 1965, P.L. 89-10, Title I. These funds will be used this spring and summer to provide programs to improve the reading skills and basic language arts proficiencies of children in grades 1 through 12. The children who will be enrolled in this program are children with reading and language arts deficiencies and are one year or more behind in these areas in their grade placement level. A survey done several months ago in the local system pointed out that about one hundred students were in need of this kind of corrective program, and on the basis of this need the funds were made available. Immediate steps will be taken to get all of these students enrolled in the program. Local staff members who have indicated an interest in working with these children will administer and staff the program.

Superintendent Swartz reported to the Board of Education that the State Department of Education had approved the district's application for bond qualification. Pending the approval by the Municipal Finance Commission of the sale of these bonds, the school district is in a position to go ahead with the building program approved by the voters in the December 16 bonding election. A tentative schedule as outlined to the Board of Education at its Monday night meeting indicated that drawings and specifications would be available to contractors the middle of May and the district could expect to receive bids around June 15, 1966.
