A new farm wheat allotment may be established for the 1967 wheat crop for farms that did not have a 1966 allotment and meet eligibility requirements, Mr. Earl Doletiky of the Washtenaw ASC County Committee announced. A 1967 wheat allotment will

automatically be established for all farms that had a wheat allotment established on the list for To be eligibile for a new farm allotment, the operator must ex-

pect to receive 50 per cent or more of his income from the production of agricultural commodities on the farm; neither the owner or the operator may have an interest in any other farm which has a 1967 wheat allotment: and the person making application must have had at least two years experience in the last five years in producing wheat.

Applications for a new farm allotment must be filed in the county office on June 30, 1956 or before. Any interested producer should contact the county office before the final date for filing

The Huehls do general farming and have dairy cattle, sheep and hogs. The frame barn which John erected before his death is still in use and has hand-hewed unspliced timbers, 40 and 50 feet long held by wooden pegs. About 50 acres of the land is timbered.

The Centennial Farm Program in Michigan was established in 1948, according to Secretary of State James M. Hare, whose department directs the activities of the Historical Commission. Since that time, certificates and metal markers have been given to more than 1,800 Michigan farms.

The markers are provided by the Consumers Power Co. and the Detroit Edison Companies.

For the purpose of selecting Centennial Farms, the Hisotrical Commission considers a farm to be 10 or more acres having estimated sales of more than \$50 yearly, or less than 10 acres and estimated sales to be \$250 annually

Persons owning farms who wish to apply for Centennial Farm certificates are asked to write for an application to the Michigan Fistorical Commission, Michigan Department of State, 3369 N. Logan Street, Lansing 48918.
