SERVICEMAN WRITES HOM

Dear Mom and Dad: Guess the only way to write this letter is to give you a step b

step account of the trip-Thursday, May 26 We got up at 4 a.m.. Between 4 and 5 a.m. we turned in our lin medicine candidates, 731 master's linen and ate breakfast. At 5:45 a.m. we left to be checked o

We arrived at the airport at 7 a.m. and checked out at 8:15 for Philadelphia, Pa. We flew over the Indianapolis Speedway for ranadelphia, a couldn't see much because of the altitude. We were flying at 13,000 phroy delivered the commencement feet. Arriving at the airport at 11:30 a.m. we took a bus to Fort McGuire Air Fome Base in Wrightstown, New Jersey.

> We left the McGuire Base at 1 a.m. Flying at 34,000 ft. we didn't have much of a chance to see London for the clouds. They said the temperature was 75 degrees below zero and the plane was traveling at 600 MPH.

We arrived at Frankfurt, Germany at 7:05 a.m. your time is 1:05 p.m. here. We are 6 hours ahead of you! It took an hour to claim baggage at the terminal. and about midnight we got to bed. It takes sometime to get our linens etc.

We got up at 5:30 a.m., not much sleep. Hanau is about an hour from Frankfurt. Both the Chaplain and the Major gave us a talk. They actually served us coffee and donuts. We had a good conversation with the major and a sargeant once the lecture was

After chow we left for Wildelflecken, one of Hitler's strong holds. This is where he trained his storm troups. This is the strong hold that Patton never realized existed until he was fifty miles pas it. Patton was down in the valley when he went by and it was very well camouflaged. The hooks in the roof that were used to hang th camouflage on can still be seen. This place is known as "The Hi and is situated on a hill. The scenery from this point is beautiful. Now I can see why this is called God's Country-looking at the scenery, that is what it is.

Went to the EM Club and there was some good entertainment. This included a band and a floor show that was pretty good. They had all kinds of mixed drinks and beer. Both are cheap compared to prices back home. Before this we ate chow and got acquainted with the post. It isn't big, but we still didn't get to see it all.

Tuesday we process and after this we get a permanent company To make sure that i wouldn't forget anything I took a few notes. As you can see by this letter I arrived safely with no problems wh soever. After Tuesday I hope to have a permanent address. I will write to you as soon as I find out what it is. I am in need of sleep and hope to get some tomorrow. There isn't much to do until Tue day. I'll want you to send my German book as soon as I find out what the mail service is.

I didn't get up until noon. It seemed good as I needed sleep. I looked around the post in the afternoon and went to the 6:30 p. show. After that we went to the EM Club and listened to the ban until it closed at 10:45 p.m. Will write more tomorrow.

Menday, May 30

Here it is early afternoon. No, I didn't just get up if that is what you are thinking. But I did sleep until shortly before 10 a. For the present there isn't much else to do. But all this will chan on Tuesday and it will be a welcome change. This is getting a

Tuesday, May 31

Today we went to personnel to find out where we were going what we are going to be doing.

The one sargeant said he would like to know if I would like to get into maintenance and I told him that I would as it is working with trucks and wheeled vehicles in one section and in the other work on heavy equipment. I don't know yet if this is what I'm going to be doing as they sent five of us to D Company which is located at Badhurstfield. This to us is interesting because it is within 10 miles of the Czechoslovakian border.

If everything works out right I'll be a maintenance man down here. I hope this is what I get, as the work seems as if it would b interesting or should I say that it is the type of work I think I would

By the time this letter reaches you I'll be back as we have a 2 day training period up there. This will be about the same that we had in All. Thought I was out of it temporarily. Ha! Ha!

Happy Birthday, sister. Thought that I would forget, didn't yo Well, I didn't. Isn't that a surprise!

Today they issued us most of our equipment and tomorrow \mathbf{w}^{g} start in the field for 20 some days. We stay in the barracks at Wildflecken. They told me today that I was to get on the job wall ing a a mechanic. This includes both gasoline motors and engines. Funny thing about the army, they train you in one thing and then pl out you in something else.

On this field trip we take almost everything that we have. At the only thing you don't take is your dress uniform and we are even taking one pair of dress clothes.

On this day, between the hours of 4:30 and 9:30 p.m., 200 plus and a continuous flow of delicately valiant chefs (no women), servers, broiled chicken to the serving lines. hosts and cashiers will serve charcoal broiled chicken to some 10,000 guests from many states and even foreign countries.

The Manchester Broil last year served 8500 dinners to people from 20 states and a half dozen foreign countries. Many of those far off visitors who once lived in southern Michigan, purposely timed their trips to coincide with the Broil.

The Manchester Broil, the most famous event of its kind in Michigan, is conducted under the general direction of the Michigan State Poultry Department and the personal supervision of Dr. Howard Zindel, head of the department.

The slow-broil method, in which the chicken is basted with butter and never burned or blistered was developed by Michigan State especially for community events. The largest committee presides and basted. The chicken is tested for finish and the cooked chicken

is delivered to the serving lines.

Again this year there will be two ticket lines and a special line for take-outs. There is a large number of hosts to show guests to tables seating twenty five hundred people at one time, and to clean up places for newcomers. There are committees for coffee maing, ice cream, soft drinks, and bringing out potato chips, radishes, and buns, for cutting slaw and bringing it to the serving tables. There is an audio committee, to announce distinguished guests and advise the waiting diners of the chicken supply.

Side attractions this year are two softball or speedball games. Visitors agree, though, that the main attraction is the broil iteself, with 3500 chicken halves broiled at one time over 300 feet of charcoal pits.

Sponsors are the Optimists and Jaycees, and all proceeds go to the youth activities in the area. Prices are the same as they were when the first Broil was held 13 years ago: \$1.50 per ticket.

'Chicken At Its Finest' KUETHERS TO **VISIT AT EMANUEL**

It's Chicken Broil time again! You can almost feel it in the air as men folk in this southeastern Michigan community prepare for the

13th annual event This small village nestled close to the Irish Hills, near Wamplers Lake and Pleasant Lake, is situated just 22 miles southwest of Ann Arbor, 22 miles east of Jackson and about 18 miles north of Adrian For several years there hasn't been rail service or a bus route but on the third Thursday in July all roads will lead to Manchester.

Just how Manchester goes about serving chicken dinners to more than five times its population is a marvel to many. It could be that Luther Klager and Rolland Grossman have something in common with the Pied Piper. They have been engineering this big event ever since it started. One thing is certain, they have the cooperation of every man in the village and the townships surrounding it.

This is no small project. It started big. At least that was the opinion of folks here when over 2,000 were served at that first Broil. But it has been snowballing ever since. Last year 8,500 were served. Where will it stop? No one seems to have the answer.

Women have no part in the dinner arrangements, the preparation or the cleanup. It is their chance to be Queen For a Day. They can invite friends and relatives with nary a thought of who gets and prepares the food, or who works on the cleanup.

They know there will be four lines of charcoal pits totaling 300 appointed Field Coordinator of the feet to insure faster service to the guests, and that the red carpet will be out.

The chicken will be served well done and golden brown. This comes when the chicken halves have been slow broiled over charcoal pits. This chicken will be basted with 120 pounds of country fresh butter and it is never burned or blistered. It will be lightly salted. There will be no guess work when these 200 chefs set about their task. Working these long hours with the eager chefs will be the hosts, servers, and cashiers.

Chicken at its finest--the Manchester way is no happenstance. It is the result of experts in the field at the Poultry Department at Michigan State University. These men set out to prepare chicken to come into its own in Michigan. It was Dr. Howard Zindel of Michigan State who came here for that first broil 13 years ago. He wanted to make sure that the chicken was broiled just as he directed. He will be here again this year.

Men in gleaming white aprons and chef's hats will preside over the pits. Some one hundred serve on this detail alone. Sure, they will have help! The more than 2 ton of charcoal will have to be

Can you visualize about 3,600 pounds of cabbage being consumed

in a single meal? This would make quite a mound. But come Thursday, July 17 all the German sauerkraut cutters will be in use and fresh heads of cabbage will be converted into slaw with a vinegar and oil seasoning accented with plenty of celery seed, second to none. All the buns which will be served will be baked right here in the Manchester Bakery. The more than 25,000 radishes will be grown on a farm near here. There will be potato chips, coffee or milk on

up to date on this possible use of themenu. Sound good? It is. Professor Zindel will tell you that the secret of the whole thing lies in the way the chicken is broiled. Every piece is tested. Chefs was taken by the Commission nor wearing white canvas gloves check the chicken. The meat must move free of the bone when it is done. This is the important test. No amateur works in this department. This is a job for the skilled chef. It takes 1 hour and 45 minutes to slow broil a chicken half. During that time it is turned 50 times. And men will wear out 100
