



MYI TOUR A SUCESS

The Musical Youth International (MYI) program, through young people, is achieving its purpose, according to four Washtenaw County

The four recently returned from a five-week tour of Europe under the auspices of the MYI.

The 96 touring students were about equally divided into a band and chorus. Nancy Girbach and Mary Beach were members of the chorus. Beth Volz played in the band and Gay Wedemeyer was both a member of the band and chorus. All four are from the Saline area. The experience wasn't new to Gay and Mary. They were both

members of last year's first tour of the MYI to Mexico. They found there was a much tougher schedule this year and they had much less free time. In fact, there was only one day that the travelers ! d for themselves. The musical group gave 69 con-

certs in the five weeks they were gone: While visiting in Fintefract, England and staying with an English family, Nancy Giroach was taken ill. In less than four hours from the time the doctor was summoned she was in surgery for an emergency appendectomy. She said that after the family physician diagnosed the case he called a surgeon, who came to the home and

confirmed the diagnosis. So for five days she was at the Pontefract General Infirmary where she was treated royally. Just two weeks before she was hospitalized Princess Margaret had been at the hospital for the dedication of the new unit. Nancy said that work was still being done on a new wing. Nancy's tour was interrupted for two weeks but she joined the rest on July 15 in time for the trip to Belgium.

But she missed the Tees-Side International Industrial where the band from this area won first place--about \$700. The chorus took third place, worth about \$120. The girls said that this money will be used by the MYI for a scholarship fund. Austria placed first and Sweden won second place in the chorus division.

The girls said that all of their concerts were very well received and that record crowds attended except one -- an outdoor festival at Edinburgh, Scotland where it rained most of the time.

"You couldn't blame people for not wanting to sit out in the cold and rain. But we gave the concert just the same," Gay said.

The choral director, Lester McCoy of Saline, collapsed the day after Nancy was hospitalized. He and his wife remained at the hospital for two weeks. During that time the seven counselors were in charge of the tour.

Mary bought a recorder (musical instrument) in Germany. She said she had always wanted one. Gay brought home a German stein They found the food to be much like our own and couldn't say enough for the homemade bread and pastry. They pointed out that teen-agers eat fish and chips, much the same as hamburgers and hot dogs here. But they were surprised that soft drinks were never

refrigerated and that milk was seldom served. Beth pointed out that by staying with host families they became fairly well acquainted with the customs of the countries. Nancy found it hard to comprehend that there was no expense connected with her stay in the hospital because of England's socialized medical program which includes visitors.

They were proud that the chorus and band boasted high ratings in the competition with others throughout the world at Tees-Side International

"And when we concluded each concert with "The Battle Hymn of the Republic" we really brought down the house," they said.





Reimbursement for the service is made to the Washtenaw County Health Department and Affiliated Agence cies either through the fiscal inter mediary which, in Michigan, is Michigan Hospital Service or by the patient or another agency which may be responsible for a portion of the service.

The Health Department and Affiliated Agencies has interpreted service to physicians, hospital administrations and others in the community. It wishes to make the service known and have it used in accord with need. The Home Health Agency will make every effort to make service of high quality available to the com-




