



SKILLET CHICKEN

- BARBECUE 1 3-lb. chicken 1/4 cup flour
- 1 tsp. paprika
- 1 tsp. salt ½ tsp. monosod glutamate
- 1/4 tsp. pepper 1 101/2 oz. can tomato soup 1/4 cup oil or shortening
- 1 cup water ½ cup finely chopped onion
- 2 tbls. vinegar 1 tbl. Worcestershire sauce
- 1 clove garlic, minced 1 tbl. sugar
- 14 cup lemon juice

Disjoint chicken into serving size pieces, wash and dry. Mix flour with paprika, salt, monosodium glutamate and pepper. Coat chicken pieces with flour mixture.

Heat fat in aluminum electric skillet set at 350° F. or over moderate heat in nonelectric aluminum skillet. Brown chicken in hot fat, placing pieces on plate as they are browned. When chicken is browned, add remaining ingredients to skillet and bring to a boil.

Reduce heat to 225° F. or low with non-electric skillet. Return chicken to skillet. Cover and simmer about 30 minutes or until chicken is fork tender. Makes 4 servings.

DOLLAR FARMING.

THE HIGHER SOYBEAN PRICES GO the more it pays to save every bushel. To keep harvesting losses low set the combine to cut as close to the ground as possible. Engineers say you'll lose ½ bushel an acre for each inch of cut above ground level. For each inch of cut above 4 inches you'll lose more than a bushel per acre. At a 5-inch cut you could easily be losing 3 bushels per acre. At 33 a bushel, you are leaving 53 on every acre.

"WET" FEEDING HOGS has been gathering interest. Ohio State University has developed a paste feeding system and at least one manufacturer has put out a liquid feeder. They are attempts to reduce labor and gain greater feed and equipment efficiency. In Ohio's system enough water is mixed with the feed to make a paste which is pumped through a pipe to a circular feeder serving four pens. It is automatic and has produced more efficient gains than self-fed pigs on the same ration in a dry form.

improved Dairy Outlook calls for some possible changes in herd management and better equipment and facilities. For instance, with higher feed costs, higher milk prices, and strong elemphter cattle prices, good records are a valuable tool to determine which cows should be culled. Use DHIA records — cows on this program samed \$219 more than others in the 1965-86 year. Also use good AI bulls to apgrade your herd and avoid using beef bulls.

No one needs to tell the Brooklyn football team that Manchester quarterback Pat Wallace was on


The Flying Dutchman signal caller completed six of 15 passes for three touchdowns.





FOOD COUPON AID

COUNTY POOR TO GET

Washtenaw County has been cluded in the federal Food Stamp

Other Michigan counties are Crawford, Gratiot, Ingham, Iron Jackson, Keewanaw and Midland

Alfred Brose, Director of the Washtenaw County Department of Social Services, said that although he did not know all the details of the recently announced program, those families and persons under public assistance and others classified as low income groups would probably be eligible for the Food Stamp Program.

Up to this time, Brose said, persons receiving public assistance at the time of the heart attack. get surplus foods at no cost from distribution centers in Ann Arbor and Ypsilanti.

Under the new program, Brose said, these same persons could buy food stamps at a discounted price. For example, a stamp redeemable for a dollar's worth of food could be purchased for 75 cents. A stamp owner could then go to a store of his choice and buy a dollar's worth of food for which he gives the stamp for which he paid the cost of 75¢ or three-quarters of the actual

Brose explained that in this way a person on public assistance can receive a greater variety of food than that available at the surplus food distribution centers.

personnel volunteering their time. it was not even necessary to hire an architect to plan the camp. Everyone contributed whatever skills they had. Very few workers are salaried. Those on the payroll are mostly students who help around camp in the summer or who work with the five nuns who are on

the kitchen detail. The people seem to be bonded together by their cultural ties and the hardships they have endured. This camp, far away from the hustle and bustle of the city, seems to remind those homesick people of their own country.

The land is rolling and very picturesque around Thorn Lake. Most of the campers come from the Detroit, Cleveland and Chicago areas.

"Here at camp we are attempting to teach our children not to lose ties with the old values, build character and to bring our people closer together in our adopted land. By so doing we hope to make our children better citizens of this country, appreciate what they now have and not lose contact with one another," Damusis said. "We do not want Lithuania to become a country of the past."

The first immigrants used to come to the camp on week ends and work long hours putting up the buildings. But now there are blacktop roads all over the area and blacktop walks.

Although the camp doesn't completely close down during the winter, there is but one big picnic remaining on Sunday, October 2, for all the campers to gather


