





RESEARCH FOR MOST POPULAR

CHRISTMAS TREE

DECEMBER 8, 1966

Michigan is the nation's leading producer of Crhistmas trees, accounting for 10 per cent of all plantation grown trees sold in the United States.

Scotch pine is the most popular Christmas tree sold in the state. This combination should spur some important research. It does.

Michigan State University forestry researchners, Jonathan W. Wright, has a Scotch pine project that is the largest and most comprehensive experiment of its kind in the world. It involves more than 100,000 trees on 15,000 plots in 39 separate localities throughout the U.S. and Canada.

This past year, Wright had nade hybrids of various races of cothe pine trees that are better shaped, better colored and more insect resistant than varieties

now being grown. One of his main efforts has been Ann Arbor. aimed at finding trees resistant to the pine sawfly. The larvae of the insect attacks the pine and can destroy its needles. Wright has found that the Scotch pine that originated in eastern Europe has a resistance to the pests and is breeding this resistance into the

new hybrids. Wright has also found that the best colored Scotch pines come from seed which originated in Spain, southern France and Scot-

"The Belgium, French, Italian and Hungarian types are medium green in summer and winter, while the Greek and Turkish types are darker green all season of the year, he noted. "Scotch pines from Scotland are

southern European seed. "I'm not quite sure why this is

true. Perhaps it is because the trees in the British Isles are relawhere in France or Spain and evolers. ution has not yet made them completely adapted to northern con-Wright notes that Michigan

Christmas trees do better if the growers try to avoid the seed from all the northern parts of Europe, particularily from the Ural mountains which separate European and Asiatic Russia. "Trees grown from these seeds

develop yellow needles," reports Wright. "They start to turn color in early September and by Christmas time some of the needles are almost the same color as a ripe



LOOK FOR HIGHER FAT CATTLE PRICES in the coming weeks. During the first quarter of 1967 prices are expected to run around \$26 to \$27. Price increases higher than this are doubtful. Heavy supplies of pork and poultry meat will be highly competitive. In 1967 prices will average higher than 1966. A major rise appears on the way for late 1967.

DAIRY CALVES can be fed corn silage in place of hay if it's good quality and fits your feeding program. But calves must eat three times as much silage to obtain the same amount of dry matter as with hay. Clean the feed box and feed fresh silage every day. Silage can be fed shortly after birth, but calves should have a minimum of 3 pounds of calf starter to six weeks of age and vitamin D sup-



CHECK STORED SHELLED CORN to be sure moisture is down to 15% or less to prevent spoilage. Run dryer or aeration fans at night until temperature reaches 49 degrees to 50 degrees F. Check temperature regularly.


