It was a cold, bright and sunny day they remember. After the ices they went to live with his parents, the John Feuerbachers, Fred was doing farm work. The next spring they moved onto 80-acre farm which they rented in Bridgewater township. Three years later, when the owner died the farm had to be sold. We decided to buy it for \$18,000. As soon as we could we every one of the buildings on cement foundations. Then we

It a large barn and tool shed," Mr. Feuerbacher explained. The land was productive and they raised everything from grain d hay to horses, cows, pigs, chickens, sheep, ducks and geese. They believed in having good fences. The need for them was ry evident early in their farming career. One day they were rking in a far field on the farm when the sheep got out and strollover into the orchard-grown high with burdock. The couple orked the entire night picking the burdock out of the wool on eir 36 sheep. It wasn't long after that until the orchard was eared. Then the sheep helped to keep it that way.

Mr. Feuerbacher says that in the busy time of the year it was ot uncommon for them to get up at three or four o'clock in the morning to begin the day's work. He knows a little German rhyme that translated means "the early morning hours get the gold." He explained that he disliked doing evening chores after dark but didn't mind doing them with lights on in the morning. Mr. Feuerbacher can't get used to seeing farmers out nights working late with their farm machinery.

Some of the modern methods of a present day farm would be and for him to become accustomed to. He feels that there is onsiderable waste. Com pickers leave a lot of corn in the field Looking back on a successful farm life he remembers that he didn't pick all the small ears of corn either. But when he finished with a field the cattle would be turned in and later the sheep would give it a final going over.

Hybrid corn doesn't interest Fred. He likes to tell about the me that he loaned another farmer some corn. It was repaid with hybrid. He promptly threw some in for his pigs. He said it was comical the way they stood around and looked at it and squealed but refused to eat it.

"You can take it for what it is worth, but my pigs didn't want any part of it. "I'll never forget one winter when the early storms caught us

and we found ourselves out husking corn just about Christmas time. ome of the neighbors thought we'd catch a good, hard cold because the weather was pretty crisp out. But we were working o fast that we kept warm," the retired farmer said.

The Feuerbachers were always noted for having clean fence ows and their thrifty farm operation.

They sold the farm on December 31, 1955 and had their farm auction January 26, 1956.

"One thing I"ll say. When we decided to sell the farm that was it. What the new owners did was none of our concern. We had had our chance and enjoyed farming," he concluded. They built their new home on East Austin Road and Mr. Feuerbacher sometimes helps other farmers in the area. A productive garden takes up some of his time. But in the winter he gets a little restless watching television.

His wife likes housework, canning and sewing. She has a number of lovely quilts which she has made in her spare time. Both have good health and are members of the Bethel United

Church Besides their daughter Irene they have two granddaughters, Mrs. Jimmie (Joyce) Mc Anally of Adrian and Mrs. Frank Cousino of Manchester and one great-grandson, Stephen Wayne McAnally. 

New Law Aids **Rural Families**

Robinson said the Demonstration ition are: two sons, Glen of Cities and Metropolitan Developnent Act, signed in November, 1966 by President Johnson, makes possible for a broader range of Washtenaw County families to qualify for housing credit under expanded housing loan authorities f the Farmers Home Administra-

The new legislation Robinson ontinued, makes more mortgage redit available to low and modrate income families in Washten-County by increasing the level of activity of the agency's rural housing loan program. Here are some of the other

changes in the rural housing loan program administrered by Washtenaw County Farmers Home Adinistration: Many Washtenaw families who ad to go the long route of plan-

ing, contracting and building a ouse can now buy newly con-Qualified low-income families can now obtain housing credit from Farmers Home Administration

on the basis of a cosigner. Previously only those rural perons 62 years and older qualified or this assistance.

The new legislation increases from \$1,000 to \$1,500 the maximum amount of assistance the agency can make for emergency repairs or improvements to owner occupied rural housing or farm service buildings. This credit is not designed to upgrade a building but only to remove hazards to the health and safety of the family

and the community. Rural families on the verge of losing their homes through foreclosure may save their homes if a sound basis can be developed by the Faremrs Home Administration to refinance their debts.

Financial assistance can be given to construct rental housing for low and moderate income rural famlies of all age groups. Previously rental housing financed by FHA had to be occupied by rural people, 62 years and older.

Loans by the Farmers Home Administration are made to the Washtenaw County applicants who are unable to obtain credit they

need from private lenders. Applications for Farmers Home Administration rural housing loans may be made at the Washtenaw County Office, 111 South Ann Arbor Street, in Saline.






