





The numerous members o this panfish tribe seem predis-posed toward breeding themselves out of existence. Not only does this inclination wreak havoc with succeeding generations, it does the fisher man little good when faced with a hungry horde of bait flinching dwarfs.

With the bluegills bedding and pumpkinseeds proliferat-ing, the prudent angler can do a good turn for both himself and the brim, claim the fishing authorities at Mercury out boards.

To exploit the clannish ways of nesting sunfish, thoroughly explore the shallows. Seldom
