The Union School was built in 1866 at a cost \$21,000. The lot that the school was built on was valued at \$1,000. The entire enrollment, from kindergarten through the 12th grade was 371 students. The first superintendent was Eugene Olney and principal, Mary Hitchcock, both graduates from Hillsdale College.

The basic pay for a teacher in those days was an extravagant eighteen dollars a month, including room and board! Most teachers stayed with area families who were sending children to the school. It was also required that all teachers could teach from the little green primer to advanced algebra.
