Prosperity is keyed to adequate anti-inflationary measures.

We must reduce federal spending and reimpose the surtax to reduce the prospective deficit for one year of 20 billion dollars. It would be near disastrous to devalue our dollar in terms of gold (presently \$35 an ounce). Other nations would do the same and chaos in world markets would






