nation in total gasoline consumption (3 billion gallons) with California (7 billion) in first place and Alaska (73 million) in the fiftieth spot.

The U. S. Bureau of Public Roads estimates that nearly 78 billion gallons of fuel have been consumed by the nation's motor vehicles in 1967, an increase of 4.3 per cent over 1966. This year, upwards of 80 billion gallons of fuel will be used:

The bureau estimates that in 1968, state and highway user tax revenues in the United States will surpass the \$8 billion mark. Federal revenues on motor vehicles are expected to reach \$3 billion and state taxes \$5 billion.

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

FROM THE OFFICE OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

Board of Education Gets Report at Half-Way Mark.

With approximately one-half of the current fiscal year behind them, the Board of Education heard a report presented by the administration at a special meeting Monday evening. Superintendent Robert D. Swartz reviewed the educational program relative to changes and improvements, gave an estimate of future plans and projects, and presented a revised budget to accommodate a lesser amount of State Aid than was originally planned on. Due to a larger penalty in the deductible millage item in the State Aid Formula and a lesser amount of transportation allowance from the state source, the Manchester District will receive approximately \$13,000 less than the July 1 working budget

The State Aid Formula for 1967-68 increased the per-pupil allowance from \$280.50 with a deductible millage of 5.03 mills to a gross per pupil allowance of \$294.53 with a deductible millage of 5.28. The deductible millage factor in the State Aid Formula is an attempt to equalize variances in the State Equalized Valuation behind each child throughout the state. In other words, the higher the state equalized valuation of a district is behind each pupil, the more you have deducted by this milage factor for your state aid allowance. In an attempt to show this in graphic form the following illustration is shown.

As the state equalized valuation behind each child goes up in a school district the deductible millage factor in the state aid formula exacts a larger penalty. This is shown above under the column labeled District's SE Valuation.

Another factor in the current formula that affects the Manchester District is the reduction in the transportation allowances from the state. On the state level this appropriation was cut from \$19,800,000.00 to \$18,500,000.00. This \$1,300, 000.00 cut affects our local district in the amount of approximately \$5.000.00.

In view of the decrease in state funds, Superintendent Swartz revised the school budget to accommodate this decrease. Inasmuch as the overall budget was extremely close to begin with, this will necessitate a reduction in materials, supplies and capital outlay improvements. After the presentation and a discussion period it was recommended that the new revised budget be adopted.

In other business the board heard reports from the transportation committee relative to bus needs and discussed other items

The overall millage for the 1967-68 school year was one mill more than the preceding year of 1966-67. This increase of one mill is exactly what the Board of Education and the administration indicated it would be when the new elementary building was discussed with district patrons. The dollar increase in current taxes is due to the valuation factor which changed this year in the school district. We hope that this explanation will suffice. A LOOK AT EXEMPTIONS

(The following article is the first end tax planning prepared for this newspaper by the Committee Accountants.)

While not classed as a "deduction," the exemption for dependents is deducted in arriving at taxable net income. In order to qualify as an exemption, a dependent must meet all tests as to (1) income, (2) relationship, and (3) support.

- 1. Will your dependent have less than \$600 gross income; to thank each one individually. Except for a child under age 19 or one who is a full-time student, a depend ent must meet the "less than 600" test. For this particular purpose, social security benefits are not counted in determining the dependent's gross in-
- 2. Is the dependent related? Other than relatives, only person who lives in your home during the entire year can qualify. Of course, this person must also meet the other tests.
- 3. Have you furnished over one-half the dependent's support for 1967? Except in the case of a relative who is being supported by several persons, this test must also be met. In those instances where more than one person supports a relative but none furnish more than one-half of the support, anyone who contributes more than 10% can claim the exemption IF each of the others supplies this taxpayer with a declaration that he or she will not claim the exemption.

Several other situations usually must be considered. For example if a dependent meets all the tests, but is married and files a joint return with his or her spouse, the exemption is not allowed. Then, too, you must know what constitutes support. Expenditures for food, clothing, shelter, education, medical and dental care, recreation, transportation, and other necessities are included in "support." If any of these (for example shelter) is furnished, rather than purchased, the fair market value of that item is used in computing the total amount of support.




