



# Shop Class Fills Need

A few years ago a number area businessmen became more and more aware of the increasing need for young men trained in Industrial Arts. Their interest and research later developed into the present Manchester High School Industrial Arts program.

John Pemberton, Industrial Arts instructor, has six classes with a two-part program in each section to first teach the basic fundamentals followed by advanced study in metal and wood shops and mechanical drawing. He has also spent some extra time with several students who have expressed an interest in automatives. He added that hopefully a seventh Industrial Arts Class dealing in the basic fundamentals of power mechanics in automotives will be added to the curriculum next fall. He feels it is important in developing interest in the Industrial Arts because of their present and future importance. Pemberton added that a young man can find an interesting and satisfying career in any of these fields and that employees are looking for attitudes as well as working

skills in their qualified help. Pemberton's classroom schedule is basically a 2-day lecture and 3-day participation program with weekly quizzes. The students learn the basic fundamentals then relate them through class projects.



### CERTIFICATION PROVES FARMERS CAN BE TRUSTED

Frank Light, Chairman of the Michigan Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, stated that compliance work is completed on all farms participating in the wheat and feed grain programs for 1968. There were approximately 66,000 farms that participated in one or both of these programs this year. All of these producers certified that they had planted and/or diverted the necessary wheat or feed grain acreage and that they were in compliance with all other program requirements. Approximately 12,000 of these iarms. were spot checked by county offices. Spot checks showed that less than 2% of that they are in compliance with Federal farm programs has greatly reduced Government costs in administering these programs.



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



### "ISRAEL AND THE MESSIAH"

The "Church" made up of born-again believers will be caught up in the air at His coming. "So shall they ever be with the Lord". 1Thess. 4:17. ### POST OFFICE MEMO

The Post Office Department today advised persons sending Christmas cards that all cards weighing one ounce or less must cary six cents postage.

In previous years, unsealed cards without a written message (only the signature of the sender) could be sent one cent less than first class postage. These would be delivered as third-class mail, without the provision for forwarding or

return if undeliverable. The postage rate legislation which went into effect last January raised the simple ratethird class postage to six cents

for the first two ounces. Since virtually all greeting cards weigh less than an ounce, the first class and third-class rates are, in effect, the

Thus, the post office notes, all greeting cards bearing six cents postage which are undeliverable as addressed shall be forwarded if a new address s available.

The Department stressed the importance of a return address to assure that undeliverable cards will be returned. This allows mailers to keep their address lists up to

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
### HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT ANNOUNCES AREAS OF RESTRICTED TRAFFIC

There are only three minor detours and one area of restricted traffic movement on the 9,207 miles of state highway in Michigan, the Department of State Highways reported
