





the car showed that the unbelted dummy was ejected from the right front passenger seat through the open side window after being shoved by the unbelted driver dummy. Accident statistics from rural areas indicate that 85 per cent of those killed in roll-over accidents had been ejected - lives that might have been saved by use of safety seat belts. These belts have been standard equipment in Ford Motor Company cars for more than five years.



The Emancipation Proclamation as written by President Lincoln is still in existence. In 1864 the document was sold at a bazaar to benefit wounded soldiers. Later, the New York legislature appropriated funds to buy the proclamation and added it to historic papers in Albany.


#### WRESTLERS BEAT HUDSON

Mr. Earl Schaffer, Consultant for Vocational Education for Washtenaw County pointed out that the plans call for a \$5 million complex, with taxation of 1 mill on the county \$1,006,623, 391 evaluation. In comparison the 1 mill would be levied on a state equalized valuation of \$21,569, 531 in the Manchester School District. This would raise \$21,570 per year in Manchester. The center would provide Manchester students as well as all Washtenaw

County students with 25 vocational programs. The center plans call for a 2,000 student enrollment who would be spending one half day in their local school and the other half at the center which would be located at Washtenaw Community College, population center of Washtenaw County. The center would permit all high school students as well as high school dropouts to enroll. Manchester students expressed an interest in attending such a center if one were available according to a survey. For the students who do not plan to attend college, this would provide courses in learning basic skills of a meaningful vocation it was pointed out. Under the proposed center the local high schools would continue to offer some industrial arts programs in preparation courses for the
