





The Clerk shall strike through the last address, ward and precinct number on the original and deplicate registration cards, and shell place the original registration card in proper precinct file. Such transfers shall not be made after the Fifth Friday next precading any election or primary election, (unless such Fifth Friday shall fell on a legal holiday in which event registration shall be accepted during the next full working day).

TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION ON ELECTION DAY

SEC. 507. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village and has not recorded such removal with the local Clerk shall exacute a transfer of registration request, listing the new residence address thereon over his signature, with the election baged in the precinct in which he is registrated at the next ensuing primary or election. The inspector of election in charge of the registration records shall compare the signatures thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration record and, if the signatures correspond, then the inspector shall carify such fact by affixing his initial upon said request. The applicant for transfer, efter having signed an application to vote as provided in Section 523 of this act, shall has be permitted to vote in such precinct for that primary or election only. The application for transfer shall be alled with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street is a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk use of the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote.



GIRL SCOUT COOKIE SALE CHAIRMAN CHOSEN

Mrs. James Kensler, 309 Territorial Rd. has been appointed Girl Scout Cookie Sale Chairman for Manchester, according to Mrs. Jack Hagopian, Plymouth, Cookie Sale Chairman for the entire Huron Valley Girl Scout Council.
