

Monday night Council set a new record, for shortness. All business was concluded by 8:30 p.m.



This will be a good opportunity for everyone to get rid of unsightly rubbish.



#### MANCHESTER FAMILY SERVICE ELECTS NEW OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS

The Manchester Family Service met at the Manchester Township Library on Hobo Party at the church. Come in costume. March 11 for their annual meeting. Several quests were present. Annual reports were submitted and filed.

tective Services led a discussion about Protective Services. Protective Services is a specialized social services provided to families of neglected

and abused children intended to improve the functioning of the family group through differential planning or to remove the children from the undesirable situation by petitioning the court.

Anyone having knowledge of an abused or neglected child under the age of 17 should be reported. They are usually reported by direct telephone contact. There is a 24-hour service.

Steps that follow for Washtenaw County are (1) Petition filed in Juvenile Court who work through the Catholic Family Services to provide an emergency temporary home for the child. (2) Report must be filed by Protective Services in 7 days and must contain a solution. (3) Prosecution then goes into Circuit Court.

The Protective Services aim is always to help the child, hopefully through assisting parents in meeting their responsibilities, but failing that, through court action on behalf of the child. A larger part of the service of the agency involves the study of the many problems existing in families where children are poorly fed, clothed, sheltered, or supervised. A problem sharing approach is employed here with social worker and client examining the difficulties and reviewing

Some actual abuses recorded are, sewing machine needle embedded in the thigh, multiple burns from a lighted cigarette, and starvation. Nine out of 200 cases recorded death resulted.

Child abuse laws will only be as effective as the willingness of the public to use them. Legal safeguards are provided by the law to protect persons reporting incidents.

Several persons, attending the meeting, asked questions regarding day centers. The Manchester Nursery was discussed. It was felt there is a need for more of these in Manchester, Apparently, there are some resources available to aid this kind of program. More information, regarding the requirements, will be sent to Mrs. Reck.


