





new classroom furniture and equipment. The remodeling project encompassing the items listed above would require a bonding issue of \$160,000.00. A millage levy of less than one (1) mill would be necessary to satisfy the debt retirement payments. The exact amount would be .82 of a mill. The issue would run for 16 years. Because the 1958 debt on the Nellie Acker son Building is being retired this year, and because the 1966 debt on the high school will be only .07 of a mill. This would amount to just seven cents (7¢) per \$1,000.00 of equalized valuation. Therefore, if the district were to approve the remodeling bond issue the overall debt retirement millage would be just .07 of a mill more on the 1970-71 levy than it was on the 1969-70 levy.

If the proposed remodeling project becomes a reality by virtue of a positive vote on May 4, 1970, the oldest building in the Manchester Public School System would be updated to current standards and would be comparable to the newest buildings.
