I do not believe that local governmental bodies should relinquish their control to the state or federal levels. I remember reading a statement by Samuel Johnson once which said, "Those who cannot govern themselves must be governed." This frightens me, and I would like to check the eroding possibilities of our own right to govern. Any government that is big enough to give you everything you and street crime. He was treasurer of Washtenaw Farm Council for 3 years, leader of Scio Lodi lunior Farmers 4-H Club for 16 years, secretary-treasurer of Washtenaw-Wayne Holstein Association, served on 4-H Council for 3 years, Superintendent of Dairy at 4-H Fair for four years, was appointed to Scio Township Planning Commission when it was first started as a seven member board and has served on the Maple Grove Community Center Committee for 9 years and on the Church Council at Salem Lutheran Church.

We should definitely have more local overnment. The reason more and more entrol is being lost is because many local governments are not doing their job. Not enough interest is shown in local politics so state legislators feel compelled to take

over more control. In Manchester Township for instance, little or no opposition has been given to the existing board for many years, and because we have lacked aggressive leadership in this and other rural townships, most decisions are now battled on a County-wide or State-wide basis. I think we can reverse this trend in our government by electing men who care about their community and aren't afraid to stand up to state officials who want more control.

CONSTABLE

Earl Alber comments as follows on our question:

"As per your request about local government. I think that nobody knows local problems like local people. As per example look at all the problems our local village and school board have because of state requirements. We should have a very minimum of state guidelines and local government could or should go from there. The bigger County and State government gets the more wasteful they become. As per our County Road Commission or the requirements for ambulances in the County. Government should stick to a middle of the road, common sense approach. Another thing local voters should study County and State candidates carefully. (They usually know local ones) and vote for the man and what he stands for and what he has done for himself and his local community and not just vote a straight party ticket. We have good men on both sides. Unless local people get involved we are going to lose all our local say and it will be twice as hard to get it back if at all."

VOTING RIGHTS OF NON-PROPERTY OWNERS

Recently the U.S. Supreme Court reversed the voting rights of non-property owners concerning bonding issues. Previously non-property owners could not vote on bonding issues but in a 5-3 decision involving an Arizona case the Court said, "The difference between the interests of property owners and nonproperty owners are not sufficiently substantial to justify excluding the latter from the franchise."

Since many area people expressed concern over this decision and how it would affect Michigan residents, four questions were submitted to State Representative Roy Smith. He acknowledged the letter and felt that since State Rep. Thomas G. Sharpe represented Manchester via the 51st District his opinions would be of more value to the residents in this area.

State Rep. Thomas G. Sharpe sent the following answers:

 Q: Why should non-property owners be allowed to vote on bonding issues when property owners must be taxed and

A: I personally am very strongly opposed to permitting non-property owners to vote on bonding issues when only property owners are taxed to pay for them. However, the best we were able to do in drefting the Michigan Constitution was to limit voting to property owners on bonding issues of more than three years duration. It would take a twothirds vote of both houses of the Legislature to change this provision, and the votes simply are not there. The rationale for permitting non-property owners to vote is contained in the Supreme Court decision you quote in your article. I personally disagree with that rationale.

Q: What would the State of Michigan do to provide for or in what way would property owners be protected from overtaxation?

A: Limitations are placed on the total amount of millage that can be assessed in the Michigan Constitution. However, these limitations do not apply to debt retirement and are far too high to be meaningful. I am hopeful that the legislature in its brief August session will pass House Resolution WWW and place before the voters this November the question of limiting school operating millage to somewhere between 12 and 16 mills as com pared to a present state-wide average of about 26 mills.

Q: What do some of these other states who have non-restricted voting on bonding issues do to protect property owners

or provide a more fair-share tax base? A: In states that presently have nonrestricted voting on bonding issues, there Thursday, August 20 at 2:00 p.m., a are no safeguards other than the action of the legislature from year to year. Most states, however, now have income taxes and find this an easier form of tax to increase than the property tax.

Q: Would Michigan stipulate a special tax for non-property owners to carry more of the tax burden than they do through rent since most of these individuals have family members using the facilities provided for in bonding issues?

A: Michigan could not stipulate a special tax for non-property owners as such since the constitution requires any type of tax be levied equally upon those to whom it applies. In other words, we could tax property owners, we could put a tax on rents if enough members would support such a tax, or we could tax any number of specific items; but we could not place a special tax on non-property owners. I personally feel that the answer lies in greatly reducing our dependence upon the property tax and shifting the burden to the income tax concept.
