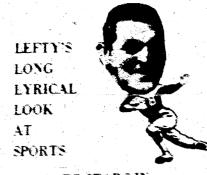

gravel. "We are buying the gravel from Manchester but are repaying them in the form of finished gravel," a spokesman said. Manchester will get a percentage of gravel per year and Washtenaw County another percentage.

He further explained that the four townships in the county who will benefit from this gravel in addition to Manchester will be Saline, Bridgewater, Freedom and Sharon "and it's not much gravel when it's spread all over five townships," he added, "especially when we only figure on using 10,000 to 15,000 yards per year. But we work on a budget too and it's expensive to operate the equipment, payroll, etc." Yard 4 has nine men working full-time under Goodell and their equipment includes nine trucks, one grader and 3 hydros (scrapers). "We cover a lot of territory and especially in the winter we can only do so much. This gravel will be a definite asset to the community." The old fence divided the village property from the county-owned property and Goodeli pointed out that the village purchased a 200-foot rightaway to the new pumping

Yard 4 was established over 20 years ago and the 100' x 50' garage was "one of Allen Schaffer's first projects," Goodell pointed out Goodell who has been at that location 19 years said, "I'm told they had a real old-fashioned German sauerkraut supper after the building was completed and ever since this place has been known as Sauerkraut Junction. They even put up a wooden sign to prove it."

Research brought about additional information about the original water tower. Clayton Parr recalls that "the summer I graduated from high school they were digging trenches for the water pipes." Mr. Parr graduated in 1909 and Frank Lowery said that the work was not completed until 1912. The tower was built by John J. Crowley Boiler Works from Jackson, the old metal plaque states. George Champe was the Civil Engineer and L. R. Hatch, Superintendent. Village Council members were Lewis Lohier, village president, W. J. Hoffer, Clerk, Charles E. Seckinger, Treasurer and Trustees Howard Clark, B. C. Tracy, Henry L. Renau, W. A. Klopfenstein, Henry Landwehr and Lewis Kuebler. Mr. Parr remembers several area boys who get jobs digging the ditches with shovels for 15 cents per hour "and they were in clover on payday." Leroy Marx recalls the bond issue to pay for the tower was voted on in 1912.

But the old water tower out-lived its usefulness and in 1969 the present 300,000 water tower was completed. Now, as a stately gentleman pointed out, "We can put the hill to good use for the people in Manchester Township."

# No World War III?


Robert Bendiner, writing in the New York Times Sunday magazine, raises an intriguing hope in suggesting that today's nuclear balance of terror has impressed itself as so terrible, on leaders of both sides of the Iron Curtain, that a third World War has been avoided largely because of its


Bendiner notes there have been many international crises which could have produced another world war since 1945. Among them, he lists the Berlin airlift, the British-French invasion of Egypt, the Korean War, the Cuban crisis, the Vietnam war and others.

The theory is that leaders in both Washington and Moscow well realize what war under modern conditions, with nuclear weapons, means. Because it has offered such a shattering, devastating prospect strenous efforts have been made to avoid it. And it has been avoided, at least for twenty-five years, even though lesser or conventional wars have occured at various times and places.

The theory is an interesting one and warrants attention. If indeed existence of a balance of terror has been the main reason we have avoided another world arms confrontation it would seem to indicate that so long as there is something of a balance in the destructive potential between east and west chances will be good no leader will plunge the world into all-out war.

It should be remembered, in this connection, that the United States held a large edge in nuclear destructive potential for most of these twenty-five years and that something akin to a balance was probably achieved by Russia only in recent years. It is not certain what the outcome would have been, in some of the many crises of the past quarter century, had the Russian nuclear destructive potential been far greater than our own.

Cambodia

The irony of the crisis in Cambodia today is that the United States currently finds its hands tied because of public relations blunders and over-commitments in South Vietnam which have shell-shocked Congress and the public concerning U.S. Asian policy.

The obvious truth is that the same war is being waged in all. And the President should be free, so long as he continues to deescalate the war by reducing the number of U.S. combat troops in the area, to use small contingents in any of the three countries as circumstances require. This authority should come from Congress, though there seems little likelihood such authority will be given.

The result is likely to be indirect aid efforts, concealed aid efforts, which may not be enough to save either country from the communists. But that is what the majority of American voters, as represented in Congress, apparently want. That is what they are likely to get.

I can almost smell the wonderful aroma of wild game cooking. Whether you fix it on an open camp fire or it is prepared in your home there is nothing more delicious than wild game if it is fixed properly. It can be prepared much like regular meat in a great variety of ways, broiled, baked, fried boiled, roasted, etc. Venison marinated in wine is marvelous. Following is an excellent recipe for "Barbequed Duck." Cut the whole breasts, bone in, from

the birds, with or without the skin on, as

you prefer. Broil the breast about 10 minutes or until brown. Now sprinkle them generously with salt and paprika. While these are browning, prepare a barbecue sauce by mixing 1/8 cup of water. 2 teaspoons of prepared mustard, teaspoon of tomato catsup, 1 teaspoon of Worcestershire sauce, and 1 tablespoon of butter. Multiply these amounts by the number of birds to be cooked. Let the mixture warm slowly, not over direct

gently with the other ingredients. Continue broiling for another 10 minutes, more if you prefer your meat well browned, and every couple of minutes baste them, lavishly with the sauce. A total of 20 minutes under the broiler (a little less for small ducks) produces meat that is medium-to-rare and juicy, but cooked through. Spoon or all of the sauce, spreading it evenly over the meat, when you place the duck on a prewarmed platter, scrape the sauce drippings from the pan and pour them over the meat. This same recipe works equally as well on geese.
