Manchester to me is a place where you can learn the true value of people. It's a town that is small enough that you can call each person by name. You may not get to know them as closely as you wish, yet you know them. In the big city such relationships are usually impossible. Most of the people have grown up with each other in a town like Manchester. Also many people don't want anything changed but in todays changing world, the support of a peace-giving faith that combines the substance of the old with the light of the new is what we need. We have to change some of the old things in spite of those who don't believe in it.

The people are real here and the majority of them will reach out by all means to help which is shown by all the projects through churches, chicken broils, the Jaycee river-front cleaning project, the new Helping Hands Project, which by the way I feel is a great asset to our town even though we may not use it that much now but with the future coming along so fast you may not realize how much we do need it, and many more projects. And for those people who aren't involved in the community, get involved. The priceless gift is the joy of work and the greatest value in life is loving people and serving them.

The Village Council members of our town should be proud to represent it. But how many people even know who is on the Council? How many people take the time to read the minutes in the Enterprise? But what do the minutes tell you about the men in office anyway — that they're working to their full capacity? Or if there is something that they didn't do. You can also learn what type of incividual each council member is. The Manchester Council works hard on achieving goals that will make everyone satisfied. I think

everyone who cares should get more involved with the people who are running our town and attend at least one council meeting to know what they represent.

Many people who come into our town will fall in love with it in a few short hours. They will come right up to you with plenty of enthusiasm, asking all sorts of questions such as, "Do you know everyone who lives here?" and the number one question, "Do you know of a house for sale?" Manchester is in great need of a better housing development.

Kids from surrounding towns come here for a big night and by 10:00 they're saying "What do you do in this town for excitement?" What can you say. There is a great need for a place for the kids to go. I'm sure everyone is aware of this. I've heard talk about it for sometime but still no action. Having the K of C Hall open helped a lot. But it was only open on Wednesday night anyhow -- what about the other six nights? We need some place to go, say about 1:00 at night to get something to eat or just talk. Where can the youth gather? Everytime we get together on the bridge or streets the police are always there to remove us. You can't shut us up in our houses at 1:00 and expect us to be happy. We can only grow mentally by doing our thing. You learn life by living it, not reading about it.

The schools in Manchester are pretty good. The majority of the people are really proud of them. The biggest thing at our school is sports. The parent's don't realize how much it helps to have them there supporting our teams. But where can they be found at the less talked about sports such as cross-country, track and girl's basketball? Our athletic director is one of the greatest people alive. Mr. Korican will jump down anyone who shows bad sportsmanship. Manchester should be proud of their sportsmanship as shown in the players and the spectators. There are many schools who envy us!

There are many changes that Man chester could use. For instance, a better ambulance service. It takes so long for an ambulance to get here then when it gets to town, it gets lost half of the time. But to talk about one of the most needed changes - and that is getting the minority of the people with the majority of the people. Also getting the adults and the adolescents together. People for the first time must face the changes in society, all those big changes you hear about in the cities are coming to our town. They're developing more and more I've heard people talk about drugs as if it's no problem in our town, but it is. For a town that used to have a brewery, beer drinking has been known of since before my time. But now beer isn't the thing and drugs are creeping in on the kids of our town. It's not just the lower class people who are taking them. Kids in school are on them but what can you do, you can't rap on a person you grew up with and think the highest about. But that's why now more than ever, everyone in our town town must pull together to bring a society that is worth living. Think about it.

in my thoughts of Manchester, I've hit lightly on a few topics of concern. I hope my thoughts bring more thinking than anything else. Manchester means a great deal to me. I've lived here all my life. I want to get away from here next year so I may find the right thing for me, which I feel everyone should do sometime in their life. But after awhile I want to come back to my town to bring my children up in a community that can work together. Manchester is what you make it, it can be a pretty cool place but we must take care of it







Moved by Reinhart, supported by Mahony that Village adopt special assessment district number 3. Duncan Street - Curb and Gutter Installation. Resolution 1. Whereas, the Manchester Village Council deems it necessary to make public improvements as follows: Install curb and gutter on the following described premises; on Duncan Street in the Village of Manchester, Washtenaw County, Michigan on the south side from the middle point of the north line of lot 8 block 45, Morgan's addition to the west line of Hibbard Street and on the north side from the east line of Morgan Street to the west line of Hibbard Street. Now, therefore, be it resolved that the Superintendent of Public Works cause to be prepared plans, specifications and estimates of the cost and that the same be reported to the Manchester Village Council when complete, and Be It Further Resolved, that 50% of the cost thereof be defrayed by Special Assessment upon the lands benefited by said improvement. All yeas, carried.

Motion declared adopted 10-19-70. The change order of McNamee, Porter & Seeley in regard to Duncan and Divi-At 8:00 p.m. the Council recessed for 15 minutes to rid the Council chambers

of wasps. The meeting resumed at 8:15 p.m. Permission for the DPW to obtain a bid from Washtenaw Asphalt on Main Street was requested. Moved by Scully, supported by Scully to extend such per-

mission. All yeas, carried. Bob Lowery brought up the costs of running the sewer for the new Methodist Church up Ann Arbor Hill versus across the school property.

Moved by Mahony, supported by Curley to permit the transfer of funds as necessary to the Local and Major Street accounts from the General Highway Fund. All yeas, carried. Mahony reviewed the September financial report. Moved by Curley, supported by Scully to put any temporally surplus funds into CB's at the Union Savings Bank, Manchester.

Fitzgerald reported on permits: Alteration & Building permits issued to Lloyd Ahrens, 416 E. Main to reside house for \$800.00; Ken Ferguson, 344 Macomb to alterate porch by Braun & Finkbeiner \$1,000; Eugene Culp to relocate and repair

Adoption of a kennel ordinance was brought up. A copy of another community's ordinance regarding kennels was given to Mr. Roesch to aid in drawing up a sample for the Village of Manchester.

Fitzgerald suggested that whenever a permit is acquired for \$3,000.00 or over the final inspection be made by the building inspector and the tax-levying assessor. It was felt that an ordinance or agreement should be drawn up to this effect. A letter from the State Highway Department was read concerning the section of M-52 through the village. No mention was made of engineering on the curve across from Nellis Ackerson School. Dave Little was asked to check into the

A copy of a letter sent to Penn Central Co. by our attorney, Mr. Roesch, was read. Penn Central wishes to chrage the village a rental fee supposedly on property owned by the village.







WHAT MANCHESTER MEANS

Max Shinabery, a native of the Hills-dale County area of Waldron and Hudson believes, "Things don't happen - people make them happen" and, he added, putting this to practice will be most important for the future of Manchester.

A graduate of Waldron High School, Mr. Shinabery, his wife, Jan and daughters Terry Ann and Shawn Michelle moved to Manchester two years ago. Mr. Shinabery was an Insurance Agent for the Farm Bureau Insurance Group for 3½ years prior to becoming the Agency Manager for the Ann Arbor Office.

The Shinaberys live on Sharon Valley Rd. and Mr. Shinabery is associated with the Jaycees, the National Association of Life Underwriters, Masonic Lodge in Waldron and was previously on the Hillsdale County Republican Executive Board.

To Max Shinabery, Manchester means:

Almost two years ago I was asked to move to the Ann Arbor office as Agency Manager. So, after deciding to make this move Jan and I began the task of finding an area we thought would be conducive to raising our children. Almost immediately we ruled out Ann Arbor and Ypsilanti, as we both have small town backgrounds. This left only about three or four towns. It appeared that Manchester and Saline were our first and second choices. We were lucky enough to find a suitable home in the Manchester area.

Now, although there are probably some changes we would make, we liked what we saw in the way of schools, churches, etc. We also felt that there was an air of friendliness here that even our previous community didn't have.

This community seems to pull together with force that would make others astounded and envious; such as the Chicken Broil, Community Fair, Jaycee and Optimist projects, among many others.

However, I shudder a little when I d some of the articles and hear som of the comments that are made regarding changes that should or shouldn't be made. Don't misunderstand, I am for progress and I realize that changes must come about; but I also feel it must happen at a pace that the majority can stand. It appears that some of our vounger people want drastic changes as of yesterday, while some of the older ones may be content to leave things as they are now. Neither of these philosophies are going to get a very wide acceptance. Therefore, we are going to have to maintain patience to change a little slower at one end and have the ability to put up with some changes at the other. Fortunately this community seems to have the ability to do both of these for the most part.

Various projects have demonstrated this, as we can see three generations promoting and helping side by side on them. This has certainly got to reflect a healthy community.

In the short time that I've lived here, I can see a substantial change, especially of attitudes. For example, drive through Main Street and compare it to memories of just a couple of years ago. Buildings have been worked on and painted. We must certainly commend the businessmen for cooperating to the extent that they have. They certainly have demonstrated community spirit, as well as self-pride and respect. This area does a great deal to maintain a good image.

On the other hand, there are probably some things that should be done. Personally, I'd like to see a traffic light at M-52 and Main Street - at least during peak traffic hours.

I also believe the community should get behind an idea for establishing some kind of teen recreation spot in town. We really can't condemn these youngsters for sitting on the corners when we aren't providing a place for them to meet. Not counting churches, there are three or four places in town where Dad and Mom can spend an evening now and then, and many of us do.

Maybe something like a bowling alley in town would help accomplish this. Many ideas could be investigated and I know that some have been and still are; but before any of them can become a reality we have got to make them happen. As the saying goes, "Things don't happen people make them happen."

I would like to sum it up in this way:
This is a swell community and my family
and I are happy to live here. We have
made several good friends and acquaintenances, for which we are grateful. However, I hope the community doesn't feel
that it can't become even better. I believe
it can if enough of us believe that it can.
