

TOWNSHIP SUPERVISOR **RETIRES AFTER 20 YEARS**

Clayton Parr, Manchester Township Supervisor, recently retired from public office after 20 years of service to the community. A position Parr held since since 1950 when he was appointed to fill a vacancy left by Charlie Waltz, Parr was subsequently elected the following April, 1951 and the years to follow at every second-year election. "But now I'm ready to just enjoy myself," he said. Prior to his supervisor's post, Parr was a Justice of the Peace in the area for over 10

Township Supervisor, a job that brought "something interesting" and a continuous responsibility at all hours of the day. Parr pointed out that until last year, the Township Supervisors were a vital part of the Washtenaw County governmental body. Commissioners are now elected to make up the Washtenaw County Board of Commissioners, thus the Township Supervisors are concerned only with their 36-square mile township problems, he explained with this recent change the biggest change in the post renovation. "I really enjoyed working on the County Board though," he added, "because we were directly involved in our county government. We felt a small part of our county achievements." He added that during his years on the County Board, the new county building, jail and juvenile home were only a few of the assets to the county that he helped in some way to achieve. 'We only did a small part but still the Township Supervisorswere a part of that achievement."

Current duties of the Township Supervisors are to assess property values for taxation purposes, act as Chairman of the Township Board, follow up building permits, which he stressed are issued at the County Building and which are important n determining the state of that dwelling for the yearly tax purposes, and "generally handle a hundred-and-one problems" that arise throughout the township. A resident might call as to how to find out about drainage for a possible building site, a dog has mauled a flock of sheep or working with the village council on any number of projects, he pointed out. "We get a little bit of everything whether we can handle the problem or suggest the right individual

Tax assessment is the major responsibility however. A state manual plus the building permits are major guidelines for tax evaluation, he explained. One topic arose involving home improvement and Parr explained that painting or putting a new roof on a home does not increase the tax. The State does specify however, that a building addition or "change of cover" such as aluminum siding on a previously wood-sided home for instance, would increase the property tax. Property assessment is taken between January 1 and March 1 and as Mr. Parr pointed out, the condition of a new home for example, is taken in that time regardless of whether or not it is scheduled for completion within that same year. If the house is 40% complete by March 1, that is how the tax is based for that particular year. When it's completed the tax is re-

He went on to explain that before the recent changes the village prepared their own tax evaluation but now the village and township roll must be exact duplicates so the full responsibility of the tax roll is now a part of the Township Supervisor's ion. He continued to say that the village council and township board have always worked harmoniously and have achieved many assets for the community.

Parr compared the first tax roll he prepared and the 1970 roll. In 1951 the equalized value of Manchester Township was \$3,013,680 to the 1970 figure of \$12,183,150. The total tax levy in 1951 was \$64,443.06 to \$454,893.50 in 1970.

Billings was defeated at the polls by Lyle Widmayer who resumed the duties of trustee at noon on Friday, November 20.



COUNCIL MINUTES November 2, 1970

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by President Little at 7:05. Trustees present were Curley, Fitzgerald, Mahony, Reinhart and Scully; absent Walton. Other Deportments: Washtenaw County Sheriff 7; Services Rendered, etc. 52; Traffic Violations: 16 moving violations issued) 1 disobeyed stop sign, 2 excessive noise, tires; 1 expired registration plates; 2 operator's license violations; 5 speeding violations; 2 improper lane usage (crossing yellow lines), 1 no registration on person; 2 careless driving. Total warnings: 55. Parking Summons: 8 Arrests: 1 arrest made for Washtenaw County for warrant out of Wisconsin. Accidents policed: 1 property damage accident policed. Other police activites: 9 major complaints investigated, 1 door found unlocked, 1 window found open. 2 traffic assists for funerals, 4 traffic assists for fires - received new portable radio 10-9-70 and is in use, led snake parade through town on 10-15-70, led homecoming parade through town 10-16-70, turned in \$26.00 parking summons money for Sept. & Oct., caught 3 minor girl soaping windows Halloween night. No reports of any destruction again this Halloween night.

The safety of children near Luther Klager School on M-52 was discussed. The council felt that posting of signs should be called to the attention of the State Highways Department as there is nothing presently posted to indicate a school zone. The DPW will contact the State Highways Dept. for a more appropriate speed in the school vicinity as well as proper signs.

There was discussion on the special assessment for curb and gutter on Division. The village will pay 50% and the individual property owners will pay the other

At 8:00 p.m. Attorney Roesch auctioned off lot 6, block 16 original plot of Manchester to the highest bidder, L. V. Kirk for \$500.00. Moved by Fitzgerald seconded by Scully the Village purchase lot 8 block 16 original plot of Manchester from L. V. & Flornece Kirk for \$500.00. All yeas, carried.

Moved by Scully, supported by Reinhart that the following resolution be

Whereas, the Village Council by resolution adopted Sept. 21, 1970, declared its intention to vacate the unnamed street or alley lying between Blocks 15 & 16, original or old plat of the said Village of Manchester as therein set forth and set November 2, 1970, as the last date to file objections thereto, and

Whereas, notice of said intention has been duly published in the Manchester Enterprise once each week for four successive weeks prior to said date, and Whereas, no objections to said vacating were filed,

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the Village of Manchester does hereby vacate, discontinue and abolish all that part of the unnamed street or alley lying between Blocks 15 & 16 original or old plot of the Village of Manchester, Washtenaw County, Michigan, according to the recorded plot thereof in the office of the Registrar of Deeds for Washtenaw County, Michigan.

Mr. Roesch advised the council of the letter he had written to Mr. Gordon . Gable, from whom McPherson Oil Company has leased property in Manchester. Mrs. Walsh is not satisfied with the blacktop around her back step. Bruce Daniels was asked to go and see her and find out what the problem is.

The Duncan Street Bridge is near completion. The sidewalks will go on as soon as weather permits. The bridge will probably be blacktopped next week. Public Works Commission is setting up a meeting with Ayling-Cunningham in hopes of speeding up the work.

Moved by Mahony, supported by Curley to accept Washtenaw Asphalt's bid on re-surfacing West Main Street from the west village limits to Union Street. All yeas, carried.

The possibility of a new dump site was discussed and further inquiries were to Moved by Scully, supported by Reinhart that we adopt a resolution that there be no parking on any village street between the hours of 2 a.m. and 5 a.m. from

November 15, 1970 to April 1, 1971. All yeas, carried. Bruce Daniels reported on an estimate from Davey Tree People for trimming and removing necessary trees. They average the cost at \$75.00 per tree to remove trees to grade level and about \$300 for trimming. They would use a work crew of 3 men for the job. We have 29 trees marked which would cost us approximately





The Michigan Public Service Commission, because of a shortage in natural gas supply and to protect service to existing customers, has authorized Consumers Power Company to impose certain restrictions on the sale of natural gas to existing and prospective customers, and has directed the Company to publish the essential portions of the Commission's order. These are:

1. All commitments and applications for future residential service, including apartments and mobile nomes. existing on the date of the Commission's order (November 9, 1970) are voided.

2. No new commercial or industrial customers shall be added to the Consumers Power Company system. However, commitments already made to existing commercial and industrial customers will continue to be hon ored. The base period to measure commercial and industrial loads shall be the 12 months ended June 30. 1970 or the amount of the commitment if a new

3. No new residential customers or additional residential space heating loads, including apartments and mobile homes, shall be added to the Company's system, except as follows:

A. Persons who had installed gas space heating equipment, or were in the process of installing gas space heating equipment on October 1, 1970, shall be given first priority on remaining gas supplies, provided that such persons otherwise qualify for gas service in accordance with the Company's standard rules and regulations. The right to obtain gas service in accordance with this provision shall lapse unless Consumers Power Company is notified in writing of a desire for gas service prior to December

B. All other persons desiring residential gas service. including service to existing residential units, and

new construction, must make application in writing to the Company for such service.

Applications for existing residential units may be made at any time. Applications for new residential construction shall be made after the footings and foundation walls are completed at the location desiring gas service or, in the case of mobile homes, after the concrete slab is poured.

D. Consumers Power Company, as soon as practicable. will verify by field inspection that the residential units are in existence or that the required construction is completed, and upon such verification will issue a dated commitment. Thereafter, the Company is directed to make a second field inspection in not less than 80 nor more than 100 days. If construction has not proceeded to completion of the framing and roofing of the structure the Company will advise the applicant that he has 30 days in which to carry construction to that stage of completion, or the permit will be irrevocably canceled. In any case, gas service must commence within 12 months of the original date of issuance, or the commitment will be voided. Dated commitments are applicable only to the locations specified, and may not be transferred to any other site.

E. Owners of buildings now receiving gas service in a building which is torn down because of public improvements, may transfer such gas service for the same uses to another location owned by such person, provided the transfer is completed within 12 months after discontinuance of service at the original location.

4. The procedures set forth in paragraph 3 hereof shall be followed by the Company until such time as its total confirmed estimated connected annual requirements are approximately 370 billion cubic feet



PRO-BALLPLAYER TURNS TO JEWELRY BUSINESS

"I knew pro-ball would be an uncertain career and I needed a part-time iob anyway so I started down Main Street and wound up getting a job with a eweler." and so began a career for Duane "Chink" Roller over 18 years ago.

A 1944 graduate of Manchester High School, "Chink" played pro-baseball between 1946 and 1950 at the farm clubs of the Detroit Tigers and New York Giants. He recalls that many area baseball fans may remember the scout who tapped him for pro-ball, "Wish" Egon.

It was about the latter part of his baseball career that "Chink" began working for an area jeweler, Fred Schaver, on a part-time basis. He liked working with his hands and soon decided the jewelry business was a profession he would like to continue so he enrolled in a correspondence school, soon to become a licensed watch-maker and a member of the State of Michigan Board of Horology. "Chink" had by this time, worked for Mr. Schaver for two years during which he received his jewelry license, filled his required apprenticeship and in 1952 bought out the retiring jeweler's business, then located at Lannom's. "Chink" moved the shop to Mike Wolfe's one-time shoe repair shop and continued there until December, 1959 when he became a Gambles authorized dealer.

He opened the Gambles store at its present location with the jewelry store in the basement of the building and soon had four employees including a manager for the Gambles portion of his businesses. Then in 1964, Donna and Irv Gill be came partners and managers of Gambles. "Chink" always remaining a silent partner in the business. He then moved his jewelry store to its present location

At Roller's Jewelry, personal and gift items include watched for the entire family with a wide variety of decorative and mod watchbands, kitchen and decorative wall clocks, silver, camera equipment and a wide selection of jewelry from baby rings to pendant pins for grandmother. A particularly unusual item "Chink" once repaired was a clock dated 1859 which contained all-wooden works.

"Chink" and Shirley Roller, both lifelong Manchester residents, have four daughters, Sandy a junior at Western University, Robin, a senior in high school, Michelle a high school freshman and Jill, enrolled in the 6th grade at the Middle School. The Rollers live on Schwab Road and are members of Emanuel Church. "Chink" has been employed at Double A Products the past 18 years and and particularly enjoys golfing, fishing and hunting.

TAX STATEMENTS HAVE BEEN MAILED

The Township tax statements have been mailed out to property owners at last known addresses in Manchester Town-

This year the total tax in the township is \$454,893.09 and the tax is due December 1, 1970. However, the taxpayer has until February 28, 1971 to pay without penalty if paid to local Township Treasurer. After that date all taxes are payable to the Treasurer of Washtenaw County in Ann Arbor.

The rates per \$1,000.00 equalized value are for Manchester School District \$36.91; for Columbia or Brooklyn District; \$38.39 and for Clinton District

Dog licenses can be obtained from your local Treasurer until February 28, 1971. Rabies vaccination slip which shows the expiration date of the certificate shall not be earlier than December 31 of the year for which the dog license is issued. The license for 1971 is \$4.00 for male, female or unsexed dog.

Application for Senior Citizens and Veteran's exemption may be obtained from either the Township Supervisor or the Village Assessor. You must be 65 years of age before or on the 31st day of December, 1970 to claim 1971 exemption. To qualify you must fill out the application certifying your income from all sources is less than \$6,000.00, if senior citizen, has various valuation requirement as a Veteran with \$10,000.00 equalized value on property. There is no property limits on Senior Citizen exemption and no requirement to repay the state unless there is fraud or misstatement.

Your Treasurer has been successful in 25 years to collect 95% or better of the tax amount and hopes he will be able to continue to be successful this year through your cooperation to collect an equal percentage, or better.
