The aim of a Christmas Bureau is to be sure that no child or needy person or family in the area goes without a Christmas while particularly appealing needy cases might receive an avalanche of at-

In Washtenaw County the Christmas Bureau is a division of the Salvation Army which in turn receives its names from the Department of Social Services, the County Health Department and many other agencies as well as churches and individuals. From this list, Manchester Family Service, a completely volunteer Community Chest Agency, is supplied with the names of individuals and families known to be needy who live in Manchester Township and the school district.

All names should be in the files of these agencies now, but additions can still be made by contacting the Christmas Bureau at the Salvation Army by calling

Manchester Family Service has been aided in its work at Christmastime for many years by the F.H.A. "scavenger hunt" which took place last week. The Future Homemakers of America spent an evening collecting groceries to fill the boxes which go to the needy families in this area. Local churches, organizations and individuals have also added to the Manchester Family Service Christmas fund and a number of doils have been dressed especially for the project according to Mrs. Franklin Reck, chairman.

Again this year the Sheriff's Department and the Ann Arbor Police Department through the funds from their annual football game, "The Pig Bowl", take complete charge of donating and delivering toys and games to all children in the area who might otherwise have a cheerless

Christmas.

The County has been featuring "The House by the Side of the Road", but Manchester has been fortunate to have its own version of this project at the Emanuel United Church of Christ for several years. Clothing is collected at the church where it is periodically offered to families on assistance before it is sent to the various missions. This is one of the most helpful projects in the area for the Manchester Family Service agency.

COUNCIL MENUTES
Nov. 19, 1970

December 24, 1970

Council met in special session with the meeting called to order by President Little at 9:30 p.m. Trustees present were Curley, Fitzgerald, Mahony, Reinhart, Scully and Walton.

The Village Planning Commission recommended that the Council approve the bank proposal for a T.V. banking facility, temporarily using Main Street entrance with no left turn off of Main St. into the banking facilities, with the T.V. window to be adjusted in distance from the building and exit at the Adrian St. sidewalk, and with the fences eliminated. This is predicated on the expectation that the entire parking service area be redesigned within a year. Scully suggested that the Main Street entrance should be eliminated before the facility opened. Mr. Cray, when asked, estimated that actual construction would take 4-5 days once begun. Bruce Daniels estimated that the job of revamping the parking lots on the north side of the alley would take 2-3 days. He suggested temporary barricading to mark and double-check parking spaces and through traffic lanes. Moved by Walton to accept the Planning Commission's recommendation without any changes. No support to the motion.

Mahony reminded the Council that the Bank has applied for no permits on the application of which dimensions, people flow, as well as several other things must be indicated. Any motion, therefore, must be subject to permit approval.

Moved by Walton to adjourn if no official business can be conducted. No support. Discussion ensued on whether or not a decision could be made at this time. The Ordinance Committee is empowered to approve or disapprove according to previous verbal agreement made at this time.

The chair then entertained a new motion with the understanding that the approval by such motion is not a permit to go to work.

Moved by Reinhart, supported by Mahony, that the Planning Commission's recommendation amended to read as follows be approved: to approve the bank proposal for a T.V. banking facility with the T.V. window to be adjusted in distance from the building and exit at the Adrian St. sidewalk, with the fences eliminated, with the entrance from Main-St. closed upon completion and opening of the T.V. window and with the previous parking plan north of the alley to the back of stores put into effect. This is predicated on the expectation that the entire parking service area be redesigned within a year. Curley, Fitzgerald, Mahony, Reinhart, Scully - yeas; Walton: nay. Motion carried.

Mr. John Merrill, Miss Anne Christoph and Mr. Martin Troutman of the University of Michigan Landscape Architecture Department proposed to develop studies with the village. They wish to help Manchester preserve what exists, not only in the commercial area. The Chamber of Commerce would like the group to work with them. Since their project is more encompassing than the business area they would like other interested people to join them. Moved by Reinhart, supported by Scully, to invite the group to proceed and accept help from interested citizens. All yeas, carried.

Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Scully, to adjourn. All yeas, carried. Meeting adjourned at 10:30 p.m.

Total warnings: 44 Parking summons: 27 Arrests: 3 arrests made. No. 1 Bench warrant; No. 2 warrant, destruction of property; and No. 3 warrant, breaking and entering. Accidents policed: 2 - 1 property damage accident, 1 personal injury accident (3 injured). Other Police Activites: 8 major complaints investigated - 2 doors found open - 2 traffic assists for funerals - 2 traffic assists for fires 11-7-70 - girls were caught soaping windows Halloween night; had them clean windows in the downtown area; the following Saturday - subject finished work detail assigned by court to police dept. and did a good job. 11-27-70 went to Cedar City, Utah and picked up Michael Miller on breaking and entering charge - collected and turned in \$37.00 in parking summons fines for November. d by Reinhart, supported by Scully to accept the police report as part of the minutes. All yeas, carried.

Vouchers were reviewed and submitted for payment. Moved by Mahony, supported by Scully to accept vouchers 1375 through 1444, voiding 1394, and No. 32 from the 1956 General Obligation Bond and Redemption Fund. All yeas, carried. (See separate listing).

Mahony reviewed the November financial report. Moved by Reinhart, supported by Scully to transfer \$10,000 from the General Highway Fund to the Major Street Fund. All yeas, carried.

Reinhart reported that there is still a rough area on the sidewalk near the new Methodist Church site. Mr. Powell questioned whether or not the 3 dead maple trees in front of his home are his or on village right of way. He felt that overflow from Mr. Streng's well was causing flooding of his land which killed the trees. Hollis Walker requested that the village wait on cutting down the marked trees in front of his home until curb and gutter goes in there. Tile prices were obtained on the sewer line needed for the bathroom in the DPW building. At \$1.10 foot for pipe it will cost about \$220 for 199 ft. so the cost of getting sewer and water up through the floor will be about \$800.00.

Bids from Standard Oil and Gulf Oil were read. Moved by Curley to accept Grossman-Huber's Gulf Oil bid, supported by Fitzgerald. All yeas, carried. There are complaints on the asphalt work on West Main St. Washtenaw Asphalt Co. has been contacted regarding the matter.

A question of a guard rail near Richardsons and the new bridge was discussed with the council deciding that no guard rail was needed.

Fitzgerald reported that 2 permits had been issued to Bill Bunney \$1,800 for

residing and L. Dean Trolz \$1200 for a garage.

A burning ordinance was discussed. It was decided that our present ordinance adequately covers no burning of refuse except in containers. Arrangements will

be made for pickup of leaves.

Fitzgerald resolved to adopt ordinance No. 88, supported by Scully. Said

ordinance reads:
An ordinance to mend ordinance number 63, entitled "an ordinance regulating the erection, construction, enlargement, alteration, repair, moving, removal, demolition, conversion use and occupancy, height and area and maintenance of all buildings and/or structures and their appurtenances and service equipment in the Village of Manchester, Michigan: providing an office for the building official;

defining the scope of authority of the building official; providing penalties for violation thereof."

The Village of Manchester Ordains:

Section 1. Section 3, Subsection E of Ordinance Number 63 is deleted therefrom and the following substituted therefor:

"Section 3-E Schedule of Inspections. All construction work shall be inspected before covering, including footings, backfilling against foundation, sewers, plumbing, rough framing, electrical wiring, heating units before operating equipment, final inspection before occupancy and in a final inspection of all construction work for which a permit has been issued under this ordinance shall be made by the Building Official and by the Village Assessor or the Assessor for the Township of Manchester, Washtenaw County, Michigan. When such work is ready the holder of the permit shall so notify the Village Clerk and secure approval before continuing. Failure to do so shall constitute a violation and shall be subject to the penalties of Section 3-C."

"Section 2 - When effective. This Ordinance shall be in effect from and after twenty (20) days from legal publication thereof. All yeas, carried. Resolved by Curley, supported by Mahony to adopt Ordinance 87 which amends Ordinance 61 and reads as follows:

An ordinance to amend Ordinance Number 61, entitled "An Ordinance to regulate the ownership and control of dogs within limits of the Village of Manchester."

The Village of Manchester Ordains:

Section 1. That Ordinance Number 61 be and the same hereby amended by the addition thereto of a new section known as Section 13, reading as follows:

Section 13: Kennels. No person shall own or operate any dog kennel in the Village of Manchester without having first secured a license therefor pursuant to the Dog Law of the State of Michigan Act 339 of Public Acts for Michigan for 1919. For the purposes of this Ordinance a kennel shall be construed as an establishment wherein or whereon any person keeps three (3) or more dogs, six months old or older, regardless of whether any renumeration is received therefor. No such kennel shall be operated in any district within the Village specified as a residential district under the terms of the Zoning Ordinance, and no such kennel shall be operated in any district within the Village, except under the terms of said Zoning Ordinance.

under the terms of said Zoning Ordinance.

Section 2. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall be in effect from and after twenty (20) days from legal publication. All yeas, carried.

Harry Macomber questioned where the village is going with planning. Mahony felt that some professional assistance is necessary. The Council as a whole felt that the Village Planning Commission should keep the village currently advised of what it's doing.

A letter was read from the Manchester Student Council requesting a change in location of one of the trash cans on West Main St. Council decided to provide an additional receptacle between Mrs. Davidter's home and the high school, the location requested, rather than moving one to that location.

Harry Macomber asked if the Council wished to place a Christmas ad in the Enterprise as in the past. He explained the format of this years issue. Moved by Curley, supported by Scully, to place an \$8.00 ad in the Enterprise for Christmas with the wording and picture left to the discretion of the editor. All yeas, carried.

A letter was read from our attorney, advising us that the U.S. Court of Appeals, Sixth Circuit, had denied George J. Wallace "the relief he sought." Since, according to Mr. Wallace's attorney he intends no further appeals the case is closed Dec. 8, 1970, except that Mr. Wallace will now have to serve his sentence "and pay whatever fine and costs were levied against him."

Moved by Scully, supported by Mahony to adjourn. All yeas, carried. Adjourned at 10:30 p.m.
