



At the regular June meeting of the Manchester Board of Education the Bd. appointed Mr. Jack Raffaelli, local Middle School teacher, to the position of Elementary Principal of the Luther C. Klager Elementary School. Mr. Raffaelli's appointment will fill the vacancy created by the retirement of Mrs. Birdella Flood. Mr. Raffaelli, who will be start-

ing his ninth year in the Manchester-System, is a graduate of Western Mich. University. He is presently completing work on an advanced degree at Eastern Michigan University. Mr. Raffaelli taught boys' physical education and English in the Manchester Middle School. His previous administrative experience occured in the local system when he was Jr. High Principal and prior to the time when Mr. Ted Tapping was appointed to that position. Mr. Raffaelli has had extensive coaching experience in the local system both as Head Football Coach and Head Baseball Coach. He is also sponsor and founder of the Middle School Field and Stream Club

Recreation Begins Monday June 21

The dates for the Manchester summer recreation program have been established. The program will begin on Monday, June 21, with activities at both the junior and senior playgrounds and end Friday afternoon, August 6. This year's seven week program will be highlighted by such activities as oller skating, organized basketball or boys going into the sixth, seventh, and eighth grades, volley ball, baseball, field trips, and swimming at Wamplers Lake. These are just a few of the things which will be offered to our youngsters this year.

Junior playground will be held at the Nellie Ackerson School this year and will be open to those children who will be five by December 1, 1971, and to those who have finished the third grade. The hours will be from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. Monday through Friday. There will be no aftemoon playground for this group. Jr. playground will be supervised by Mrs. Kristin Schick who teaches third grade at the Klager School. Assisting Mrs. Schick will be Susan Westfall and Mary Simmons. All children participating in the program should assemble on the small playground adjacent to the Nellie Ackerson School. Parents nvolved in picking up their children should do so at 11:30.

All youngsters who have finished the fourth grade to those who will not be sixteen before August 1, 1971 are welcomed to attend senior playground.

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Til-9 P.M.

Senior playground activities will run from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. Monday through Friday and from 1:00 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. Tuesday and Thursday at the Athletic Field.

Swimming trips to Wamplers Lake will be made every Monday and Friday afternoon beginning June 25. For those who are interested in taking Beginning minming instructions, the bus will leave the sthletic field at 12:30 p.m. and return about 3:00 p.m Only those people taking beginning swimming instructions will be able to ride the 12:30 bus. The bus for the advanced swimmers will leave the athletic field at 1:30 p.m. and be back at 3:20 p.m.

A bus will make one round-trip day to Pleasant Lake School to pick up those people interested in the swimming program. The pick-up time is 12:10 p.m. and the drop-off-time is 3:15 p.m. The bus will pick up anyon along the route between Pleasant Lake and Manchester. All youngsters riding the Pleasant Lake bus will be required to go with the beginning swimmers group at 12:30 p.m. This does not mean that advanced strimmers from the Pleasant Lake area will have to swim with the beginning swimmers. They will be allowed to swim in the deeper water.

Children who are going into the third grade are invited to participate in the swimming program. Swimming instructions will be provided for the beginning swimmers group. All younggram must return a permission form signed by their parents before they will be allowed to participate in the program. Permission forms will be issued during the first day of recreat In order to get even more youn

sters involved in the recreation program the Recreation Department has added roller skating to its list of activ. lifes. Arrangements have been made with the Skateadium in Adrian to rent their facilities on Wednesday afternoon from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. All youngsters who have finished third gre and will not be sixteen years old before August 1, 1971, are invited to participate. Youngsters from the Plea sant Lake area will be picked up by the same bus that picks them up for swim ming. It will have the same route and time schedule that it has on Mondays and Fridays. All participants will be required to return a permission slip signed by their parents. These slips will be available the first day of recreation. The total cost for each youn ster will be \$1.35 (1.00 for admission and 35¢ for skate rental). This amoun will be paid each time one goes to th Skateadium. The first roller skating date has been set for Wednesday, June

Walt Schaible Local Businessman Succumbs



Mr. Walter W. Schaible, lifetime resident of Manchester, died June 20th at the age of 60 at Herrick Memorial Hospital, Tecumseh.

Born March 20, 1904, son of Fred and Ida Ulr Schaible, he attended school in Manchester, and remained in business here for the rest of his life.

Accepting a job in the Wuerthner Bros. clothing store, he later purchased the business although retaining the old name for some years.

It was during these younger years that Walt became known as a fine musician. Playing the trumpet, he developed his ability, playing in surrounding towns, including the Hayes Hotel in Jackson.
