Charles W. Lamming By C. Chapin

Saturday, July 17th, the family and friends of Mr. Charles William Lamming of 220 S. Washington St., Manchester, celebrated his 90th birthday with a dinner at Schumms. Approximately 30 people attended the party for Mr. Lamming, who was born in 1881 in Burham, Lincolnshire Co. England, came to America at the age of 10 months with his parents Sarah (Parr) and Thomas Lamming.

After living in Charlotte, Michigan for three years, the family came o Manchester having relatives here. Mr. Lamming is a cousin of Clayton

Accepting a job working for one of the Rowe brothers they first lived in a log cabin on Ann Arbor Road between Veryl Widmayers and Leonard Ahrens house, where the lilacs can still be seen growing along the road. Reminiscing about the early life in a log cabin, a vivid memory remains of running to the little house in the backvard in the wintertime.

Explorer's Have Fantastic Trip

Explorer Scout Post 404 had a very successful canoe trip to Region 7 Canoe Base in the Northern part of Wisconsin. Two voyagers, Don Brown and Scott Gormely, preceded the trip on 6-20-71 by one week to learn the route, making and breaking of camp in learning canoeing safety. Six boys: Jim Baker, Greg Bert-ke, Delruss Wolff, Tim Ahrens, Mark Difenderfer, and Dave Roberts; and two leaders: Ted Roberts and Russ Wolff, followed on 6-24-71.

We arrived at the canoe base on Friday, 6-25-71, at 2:00 p.m. The next two days consisted of canoe safety training. This training consisted of everyone proving their swimming ability; in addition, everyone had to take a canoe out on the lake, tip it over, right the cance, and bring it back to shore. This is a requirement of everyone who takes the trip,

On Saturday afternoon we were taken to Crab Lake, approximately 35 miles from the cance base. At this point we started to paddle our way back to the base through various lakes, creeks, and several portages where the boys were required to carry their canoes, gear, plus food supplies for a five-day trip in a semi-wilderness area. The boys got to go swimming several times in the waterfalls and in the lakes.

Only one time during the five days did we actually talk to anyone outside of our group, and that was at the Marina where the boys filled up on maits and ice cream.

During this time we had two rain storms, which is normal for our troup. During these rain storms our camp was set up; consequently, our clothes did not get too wet.

The boys did conservation projects on several of the camp sites. They took turns in cooking, dish washing, and various other necessary chores these chores were assigned to them daily). Some boys went fishing, with poor results. They did catch some bull frogs; not enough for a meal, but we did have

We didn't tip over any canoes or lose any gear. At one time, on one of the lakes, we used the cances as sail boats. The boys used their panchos as sails. We had a field day for the next two or three miles which didn't require

We got to see many beaver dams, and actually saw one beaver. We also saw an American Eagle, which is a very rare bird.

We were in 12 different lakes, 3 different rivers, and traveled approvimately 50 miles. All of the boys that were able to take the trip, I am sure, had an experience that they will never forget, It is too bad that all of the explorers were not able to take the trip.

Michigan Law

As of April 1, 1971, a prospective buyer of a used motor vehicle may find he odometer of the vehicle set at zero. Act 104 of the Public Acts of 1970

nakes it a misdemeanor for any person sher the mileage registered on the ndometer of a motor vehicle offered for sale or lease other than by setting it at zero, or to offer for sale or lease any vehicle with knowledge that the mileage registered on the odometer thereof has been altered without disclosing the faces to the prospective purchaser other than by setting it at zero, or modify the odometer by tampering or by the elimmatica, substitution or addition of composents designed to increase, delete or mevent the registering of mileage. However, it is not a violation to delete or chenge commeter mileage registered in the course of pre-selivery testing by a

the motor vehicle to the dealer. A dealer is protected under this act if he possesses an affidavit from the mmediate prior owner of the mount vehigh arresting to the fact that the odometer has not been set back, and stating the exact mileage at the time the dealer purchased the motor vehicle. This affidavit shall be supplied by the dealer w eny prospective buyer on request. Giving a false affidavit under the provisions of this Act is a misdemeanor.

ions of Act 175, Public Acts of Michigan, 1952, as amended; and WHEREAS, said major street improvements are in accordance with the pur-

poses enumerated in Act 51, Public Acts of Michigan, 1951; and WHEREAS, the revenues received by the Village of Manchester from the Motor Vehicle Highway Fund pursuant to Act 51, Public Acts of Michigan, 1951, as amended, in the year preceding this contemplated borrowing are more than sufficient to comply with all the requirements specified in Section 4 of Act 175,

Public Acts of Michigan, 1952, as amended; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT: 1. The plans and estimates of the cost of the major street improvements, as

briefly set forth in the preamble hereto, are hereby approved and adopted. 2. The period of usefulness of said major street improvements is estimated to be not less than fifteen (15) years.

3. The Village Council of the Village of Manchester hereby determines to borrow the sum of Forty Thousand (\$40,000.00) Dollars and issue bonds of the Village therefor pursuant to the provisions of Act 175, Public Acts of Michigan, 1952, as amended, for the purpose of providing funds to pay part of the cost of the major street improvements, as set forth in the preamble hereto, the balance to be paid from funds on hand.

4. Said bonds shall be designated MOTOR VEHICLE HIGHWAY FUND BONDS (1971 SERIES), and shall consist of eight (8) bonds of the denomination of \$5,000.00 each, numbered consecutively in direct order of maturity from 1 to 8, inclusive, dated as of October 1, 1971, and payable serially as follows:

\$5,000.00 October 1st of each of the years from 1972 to 1979, inclusive. Said bonds shall bear interest at a rate or rates not exceeding the maximum rate permitted by law, payable on April 1, 1972, and semi-annually thereafter on October 1st and April 1st of each year. Both principal and interest shall be payable at a bank or trust company qualified to act as paying agent to be designated by the original purchaser of the bonds.

Bonds of this issue shall not be subject to redemption prior to maturity. 5. For the purposes of providing moneys to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds herein authorized, and in accordance with the provisions of Act 175, Public Acts of Michigan, 1952, as amended, there is hereby made an irrevocable




