
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



1. To force hundreds of citizens to give up their house for park land, and an artificial lake, is an arrogant denial of such Constitutional rights as to be secure in their homes, and equal protection under the law. In our country government was instigated to protect man's right to own property, not

If a man's livlihood, his business, his home, his heritage, can be taken away by government bureaucrats for such a frivolous purpose as providing others a place to play (not work) then we in this country no longer own our own property, and no one is safe from the whims of government bureaucrats.

2. It is fiscal insanity to drive hard-working, industrious tax-paying farmers and others from their valuable farm land, when in Michigan there are thousands of acres near worthless unfarmable land, and thousands of natur-

LANSING REPORT

By Gilbert E. Bursley

I am deeply disturbed by a new development of the past week in Lans-

With the question of state school aid for 1971-72 still unsettled, the threat of further slashes in this vital area has arisen through new recommendations from the Governor's budget office to the Senate Committee on Appropriations.

As Chairman of the Senate Edacation Committee, which maintains the closest degree of contact with educators and school officials throughout the state, it is my firm belief that the level of state expenditures recommended by the Education Committee would have provided an adequate but minimum level of state assistance to our schools.

Our Senate Education Committee recommendations were made with clear recognition of the tight fiscal situation confronting the state, and were more than \$4 million below the agreed-upon level of state school aid that evolved from regular meetings of 12 legislative leaders with the

That agreed-upon level of state aid to schools was widely publicized. A majority of members of both houses of the Legislature supported an in-

August 12, 1971 crease in the state income tax with the promise in mind that this level of school aid would be funded.

For new cuts, estimated roughly at \$29 million, to be proposed at this late date my well be termed a breaking of faith that has created serious questions of credibility as to the communications that have existed between the executive and legislative branches of state government.

I will of course continue determined struggle to see an adequate state school aid bill enacted for 1971-72. This is an obligation and a responsibility, clearly spelled out in the Michigan Constitution, which should transcend all considerations of partisanship or regional-

I can appreciate the fact that budget recommendations, formal or informal, are always subject to later revision in light of fiscal developments. I realize that agreements made in the context of one financial picture may have to be reopened for discussion or negotiation if the financial picutre changes.

But the schools of our state have already borne the brunt of the emergency cutbacks in state spending that were necessitated earlier this year. For new economies to be recommended at this late date, to legislators who supported a tax increase with the clear understanding that their schools would receive adequate support, is





Dr. Place pointed out that the whole donation procedure only takes about 40 minutes from start to finish, with the actual donation time taking only seven minutes.

"The summer months are also the perfect time for young people, who have reached the age of 18, to donate," he said. "Although 18year-olds know that they now have the right to vote, they may not be aware that they are also now eligible to give 'the gift of life'." Michigan no longer requires parental consent for 18-year-old blood donors.



HOMEMADE APPLESAUCE

4 pounds apples ) cup sugar Wash apples. Without peeling or coring, cut them into quar ers. Place them in a large saucepan. Add water, cover and cook over medium low heat 20 minutes or until apples are soit, stirring occasionally. Strain apples through Foley food mill. Add sugar: stir to dissolve. 
