On Sunday, September 26, 1971, Mary's of Manchester will celebrate heir One Hundredth anniversary with a Mass at 4 o'clock p.m., and an outdoor rogram and dinner in the church hall. Visiting on that day and concelerating the Mass with fourteen Priests ill be the Most Reverend Alexander Saleski, Bishop of Lansing.

It was in 1870 that St. Mary's Manchester was established as a lission with the first Pastor, Fr. Edward Van Lauwe coming from Clinton o serve the residents of this area. Later that year the first Catholic Church was built in Manchester. Located on he corner of Macomb and Wagner treets, the white frame building is w gone but the Rectory remains, and is today the Baptist Chapel.

It was in 1839 that the first atholic Church in Washtenaw County recorded in Freedom Township. A cabin on Schneider Road was the inday scene of a gathering of horse

and buggy as well as those who walked. In 1858, on Bethel Church Road, was built a small brick church named . Francis with a white plaster facing, and sometime later the brick rectory was built nearby. The church was torn down in the 1930's but the rectory still stands and is a private home. From Francis the traveling priest's came Manchester and were welcomed into the homes in the village, often celebrating Mass in the living room with the neighbors invited.

Fr. Peter Ternes was the first Resident Pastor when St. Mary's was named a Parish in 1890, accepting Clinton as a Mission. The two parishes were to serve each other for nany years.

The years went by and in 1909 Edwin Fisher, from Clinton, was signed to St. Mary's, Having been instrumental in having the Village of Clinton set aside a memorial park on U.S. 12, Fr. Fisher now began his ulding program. Field stone churhes were built in Tecumseh, Brookn, and Manchester, with the stone thered on the farms and surrounding privilege to be the pastor of this parsh.
