



The evening ended with punch and Christmas cookies for all.


Shakespeare Club



There was a brief discussion of the change in location of the postal drop box. Council requested the Health & Safety Committee to confer with postal officials in reference to a location of a less hazardous nature with greater manauverability. Merle Cummings asked Council if the alley in back of the corner Mobil

station could be closed. He was advised to check with his lawyer on the rights of a property owner regarding the use of the alley and blocking it off when the alley is private property. Mr. Cummings also questioned parking in his drive and was advised that if he wants no parking there it will be enforced by the Police

The Village Attorney was present to discuss a letter from Brian Urquhart of Crippen, Dever & Urquhart regarding the proposed landfill lease with James and Robert Hansen and the lessor's limitations on a new lease.

The following preamble and resolution were offered by Councilman Reinhart and supported by Councilman Fitzgerald: Whereas, on November 15, 1971, the Village of Manchester, County of

Washtenaw, Michigan, sold \$40,000.00 Motor Vehicle Highway Fund Bonds (1971 Series), to Ball, Burge & Kraus, of Cleveland, Ohio; and Whereas, the notice of sale for said bonds stated that the paying agent for

said bonds would be designated by the purchaser subject to the approval of the Village Council of the Village; and

Whereas, the purchaser has designated as paying agent for said bonds The Brighton State Bank, Brighton, Michigan; Now, therefore, be it resolved that:

1. The Village Council of the Village of Manchester, County of Washten-aw, Michigan, hereby approves the Brighton State Bank of Brighton, Michigan, as paying agent for the \$40,000.00 Motor Vehicle Highway Fund Bonds (1971 Series), of the Village of Manchester, County of Washtenaw,

2. All resolutions and parts of resolutions insofar as they conflict with the provisions of this resolution be and the same hereby are rescinded. Ayes: Councilmen Benedict, Fitzgerald, Reinhart, Scully, Walton Nays: Councilmen: None Resolution declared adopted.

Fitzgerald reported that the Public Works Dept. had cleaned most of the catch basins, closed a 3" valve at the old cement plant on Macomb Street, submitted a bill to Manchester Plastics for their water usage to date which was paid by check, completed motor placement at the Ann Arbor Street well house, ordered fluoride equipment November 18, 1971, cleaned and flushed out the sewer on Hibbard Street, repaired two broken water mains and unearthed a sewer pipe on Union Street. Manchester's credit in gravel from work done on the gravel hill is 1790 cu. yd. for 1971 and 331 cu. yd. for 1970 for a total of 2121 cu. yd. which represents about \$5000.

A review of insurance policies is about due and Bruce was requested to make copies available to all council members listing our present policies and a breakdown of each. Larry and Bruce were asked to make certain that the lists are complete.

Reinhart presented the final drawings from the bank noting the requested change had been made and a permit had been issued. Other permits issued were to L. V. Kirk for electrical work at Union Savings Bank and Al's Custom Plumbing for a gas furnace at 530 W. Main.

> Popular Christmas plants can ave toxic effects if swallowed, and berries from mistletoe are highly poisonous. Children are treated each year as a result of swallowing toxic holiday decor-

Hazardous man-made decora-tions include artificial snow sprays and fireplace colors.

Fire is another hazard during the holidays - take precautions in buying toys that are not highly flamable. Toys that are operated by alcohol, kerosene or gasoline are especially dangerous. Keep electric trains or spirit-fueled toys from under the Christmas tree while in use

Use non-combustible or flameproofed material to decorate the

TRAFFIC CODE AN ORDINANCE TO ADOPT BY REFERENCE THE UNIFORM TRAFFIC CODE FOR MICHIGAN CITIES, TOWN SHIPS AND VILLAGES

The Township of Manchester or-Section 1. CODE ADOPTED

The Uniform Traffic Code of cities, townships and villages promulgated by the Commissioner of State Police on February 14, 1958 and published in Supplement no. 13, and as amended both on February 14, 1961 and published in Supplement No. 25 and on February 26, 1968 and published in Supplement No. 54, to the 1954 Michigan Administrative Code, in accordance with Public Act 62 of 1956, State of Michigan, is hereby adopted by reference as in this ordin-



FIRST A FRIEND. THEN A HOST

holiday drivers now are being distributed free to all motorists by Automobile Club of Michigan, which is launching its sixth annual "First a Friend, Then a Host" (FAFTAH) program this week. Through its FAFTAH campaign each Christmas and New Year's, Auto Club points out that eight of every 10 motorist will drink and drive. Motorists and party hosts are asked to set safe al cohol consumption limits this holiday to help cut traffic deaths. To help them, Auto Club General Manager Fred Rehm is shown with an enlarged blood-alcohol calculator, which emphasizes the sensible use of alcohol by both drivers and hosts. The actual size calculator -- which allows a person to determine how much driving ability has been affected based on body weight plus the amount of alcohol drunk and how long a person has been drinking-is one of three educational items available to all Michigan motorists this holiday.

Bottle sleeves, which can be slipped over liquor bottles stress the responsibility party hosts have for guests who will drive after drinking. Another new item this holiday is a pamphlet titled "ONE DRINK (CAN BE) TOO MANY". It emphasizes the cangers of driving after drinking two ounces of alcohol, even though a person looks and feels sober. Auto Club urges that this pamphlet be made available as an educational aid, especially for every motorist from 18 through 20 who will take his or her first legal drink this New Year's and then drive.




