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Federal Tax Changes Affecting 1970 Returns

The Tax Reform Act of 1969 will have an impact on every taxpayer in the country. Although some of the provisions of the Act applied to 1969 calendar year tax returns, the great majority of changes will affect 1970 returns. Here is a brief look at some of the more obvious changes.

An estimated six million people will be pleased about the fact that they will no longer be required to file a Federal income tax return. The reason - the filing requirements have been eased.

The tax surcharge was reduced to 5% for the first half of 1970, and eliminated for the last half of the year. Thus, the surcharge is figured at the average rate of 2.5% for the whole

A new "low income allowance" eliminates or reduces the taxes paid by many people.

Every taxpayer will benefit from the increase in personal and dependency exemptions from \$600 to \$625.

A great many taxpayers will find that it is easier to compute their tax this year. The optional tax tables, which take into consideration the standard deduction, exemptions, and the new "low income allowance" have been extended from \$5,000 to \$10,000. In addition, the IRS will make the actual tax computation if certain requirements are met as well as certain portions of the form filled in.

Because of the many changes brought about by the Tax Reform Act of 1969 it will pay to carefully read the instructions that are included in the tax package, and start the preparation of your return as early as possible.

Some felt that there is too much licensing and control now, and that the professional might not be available when your crop needed attention due to weather, wind, and other factors, Some wondered if perhaps there weren't more acres of sprayed and fertilized lawns in our area than there were farmed acres so that perhaps the city people were more directly polluters of the rivers and streams than the

Federal Income Tax Refunds

The Internal Revenue Service expects to issue over 50 million refund checks this year. If you are expecting a refund, proper use of the peel-off label on your tax package will help insure its early processing. This blue label will be found on the front cover of the income tax package. Check it to make sure that the name, address, and social security numbers are correct. The preaddressed label should be peeled off the front cover and placed on the tax return that is filed with the Internal

Revenue Service. There are also several additional steps that should be taken to insure an early refund of your tax dollars. Check the following points before filing your return.

1. Use the preaddressed 2. Check arithmetic. 3. Attach a Form W-2 for each place of employment.

4. Sign your return, Both husband and wife must sign a joint return. 5. If you are computing your tax use the

correct tax table or tax rate schedule. 6 Total your deductions if you itemize them on

Schedule A. 7. Mail the return to: Internal Revenue Service Center, Cincinnati, Ohio 45298.

And don't forget, early filers get early refunds.


