



limits, so they avoid using too much fertilizer. "Porper fertilization contributes


little to the loss of nutrients in drainage waters," says Erickson. "In most instances, less than 10 pounds of nitrate are lost per acre per year -- a quantity equal to that added through rainfall. In experiments, phosphorus lost was less than one-tenth of a pound per acre per vear."
