Charles Gauss Retires From Road Commission

Charles Gauss of 429 Macomb St., Manchester, retired May 28 of this year after 44 years with the Washtenaw Co. Road Commission.

Born April 3, 1906, on what is presently the Ambrose Lentz farm on Grossman Road, Mr. Gauss attended the Zimmerman district one room school and then Union High School where he graduated in 1925.

After graduation he and two friends. Lynn Albertson and Harold Dresselhouse, took their Model T Ford, "a fine car even if she was without fenders", painted "Michigan or Bust" on her and headed for Saskatchewan, Canada to visit his uncle and work in the harvest fields. They made it to Central Butte, a little town in the center of the endless prairie, and made it home again as well.

For several years he worked in Leslie on Highway work, in Lansing pouring concrete for roads and then for 45¢ an hour for 3 years, he worked out of the Ann Arbor yards. When the County began taking care of township roads he began to work closer to home, and at 50¢ per hour he had good steady work during hard depression years.

On the day of his retirement, he asked each of his fellow employees to sign an autograph book, an old-fashioned custom. They complied, reaching a total of more than 120 names and



Completes Police Training Course

On June 23, 1971, Windle Ray, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Ray of Manchester, graduated from the Southeast Regional Criminal Justice Training Center, located at 4133 Washtenaw Ave. in Ann Arbor. Windle is a former graduate of Manchester High School in 1963.

He completed the course with 15 fellow officers from various police agencies throughout Southeastern Michigan. These agencies included Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department, Milan Police Dept., Eastern Michigan University, Livonia Police Dept., Green Oak Township Police Dept., Ypsilanti Police Dept., Monroe County Sheriff's Dept., and Livingston County Sheriff's

This was the very first class to graduate from the Southeast Regional Criminal Justice Training Center. The State Constitution says that any department which contains 3 or more men must provide their personnel with 256 hours of actual classoom training, as of January

The major part of the course was based on First Aid, Criminal Law, Physical Training & Defense Tactics and Firearms Instruction. The officers covered nearly 50 police related courses during their 6 1/2 weeks of training. Other courses included various phases of law such as Constitutional Law & Juvenile Law and many phases of the broad investigative field.

Warning To Social Security Beneficiaries

of the Social Security Office in Ann Arbor, has issued a warning to all beneficiaries, especially those over 65, that a pair of confidence men have been operating in the Ann Arbor-Ypsilanti area. At least two instances have been reported where the pair of men presented themselves at the door and identified themselves as Federal employees representng Medicare. They told their victims that they had reviewed their files and that their Medicare coverage would lapse unless they paid amounts ranging from \$30 to \$100 on the spot.

Kehoe emphasized that it is highly unlikely that Medicare premiums would ever have to be collected in person in this manner. Futhermore, any Social Security Administration employee who does call at your home carries clear identification, bearing his photograph, and he or she will be very willing to present it.
