

Warning To Social Security Beneficiaries

of the Social Security Office in Ann Arbor, has issued a warning to all beneficiaries, especially those over 65, that a pair of confidence men have been operating in the Ann Arbor-Ypsilanti area. At least two instances have been reported where the pair of men presented themselves at the door and identified themselves as Federal employees representng Medicare. They told their victims that they had reviewed their files and that their Medicare coverage would lapse unless they paid amounts ranging from \$30 to \$100 on the spot.

Kehoe emphasized that it is highly unlikely that Medicare premiums would ever have to be collected in person in this manner. Futhermore, any Social Security Administration employee who does call at your home carries clear identification, bearing his photograph, and he or she will be very willing to present it.

If any other area residents have been called on by these confidence artists, or if anyone representing Medicare does call at your door, please report it to the Social Security Office promptly, and they will refer it to the proper investigating authority. 1971 FARM PAYMENTS RELEASED

Preliminary payments are now being released to Michigan farmers who participated in the 1971 wheat and feed grain programs. On July 1 over 37,000 payments for almost 16 million follars had been processed. This is about fifty percent of the total payments to be med This amouncement was made by Nick Smith, Chairman of the Michigen State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee. These payments, he added, are made to reimhares farmers for the cost of iching productive cropland scres and maintaining that acreage in a satisfactory conserving manner.

The concept of the new set-aside program was devised to assist American fermen in producing for expended foreign and domestic markets. On the rest of their land farmers in the program can shift their production without acreage restrictions according to market needs. Such shifts hopefully will enable farmers to cut their production costs and thereby raise their farm income and at the same time make our agricultural products more competitive in foreign

Smith, in closing, stated that the preliminary wheat payments being mailed represent about 75 percent of the total expected payment. Final payments will depend upon the National average wheat market price and will be made after December 1, 1971.



Julie Jarvinen, a graduate student at the University of Minnesota, said ground squirrels, mice, shrews, spotted skunks and other animals living under a snow cover in winter die when snowmo biles compress the snow and radically

alter their environment. Dr. Fred Bess, Central Michigan U liversity audiologist, warned that prolonged exposure to engine noise while riding a snowmobile can cause permanent hearing loss.
