supplies. There were no fires, so they ate cold food. It was still raining the next day. On Friday the scouts were evacuated by bus to a school 5 miles

At last, they were out of the rain and had a chance to dry out. Sleeping on the floor of the school house, eating whatever cold food they had been able to carry, mostly crackers and bread, the boys spread out their clothes and supplies and got them dry. Stacking them in the corner, the next day they were able to hike back to camp while the Army sent a truck to carry the supplies back for them. The hike back caused them to miss the visit of the Crown Prince by half an hour. The rain began to slack a little and gratefully the scouts went to church on Sunday morning. All major religions were epresented in the campground and Anton and two friends attended a Shinto service which they found interesting even though the language was Japanese. A table with offerings of fruit was in vidence and a small golden temple about 2 feet high stood at one side.

Nature tours with thits to under-ground caves, a Scout-O-Rama, and a 10-mile hike kept them busy till Tuesday evening when the grand finale fireworks display concluded with a huge wheel and the spelling out of the word 'Savonara".

The Jamboree was now over but wo weeks of touring remained. A thrilling ride on the bullet train which goes 140 m.p.h. to Kyoto. One week was spent visiting temples and shrines and one week touring Tokyo, then the unique experience of leaving Tokyo at 8 a.m. on August 19 and arriving here at 8:15 a.m. the same morning.
