



The semi was a battle between Kelly and Junior Gary with Kelly ahead at the finish followed closely by Gary, Carr, Joe Romeo and Taylor.



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AGRICULTURE - NIXON'S ECONOMIC PROPOSALS

President Nixon's new economic proposals have been received with mixed reactions by agriculture.

The President's proposed cut in government spending, the reinstatement of the investment-tax credit plan, repeal of the excise tax on new automobiles, early application of income tax relief and efforts to safeguard the dollar are all praiseworthy.

These all recognize the influence of the dollar in stimulating effective economic growth resulting in job opportunity in America," according to William J. Kuhfuss, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation.

"Potentially the most effective anti-inflation measure in President Nixon's economic proposals is the announcement that \$4.7 billion will be lagged off the budget for the fiscal year that started July 1. We believe that excess government spending is the root cause of inflation and Congress should join with the President in resisting new spending measures of this time," Kuhfuss said.

The exemption of raw farm products from President Nixon's 90-day price freeze will only have a minimal impact on agriculture. Since processors and retailers will be unable to pass any increase in price along to consumers, price advances to the farmer will be limited to the extent to which processors and retailers are willing and able to absorb farm price increases by reducing profit margins.

The addition of a 10 percent surcharge on imports is viewed with some concern as to how it will affect agriculture.

Farm Bureau president Kuhfuss points out, "There is danger that such action will lead to retaliatory measures by our foreign customers and agriculture could be hurt seriously if our export market is curtailed. Exports represent a significant part of the total market for our agricultural production; the production from about one acre in four is exported.


