



School Closings

Once again for the sake of review and for the benefit of new people in the school community we will describe the procedure for alerting the citizens to school closings because of extreme weather conditions. In the event of severe inclement weather (snow and ice) listen WOIA Ann Arbor, Saline (6:00 a.m.), and WHFB Ann Arbor (8:00 a.m.) for announcements. School officials will check road and weather conditions prior to 5:00 a.m. and will call in the school closing announcement prior to the six-fifteen news hour (WIR, Detroit). In certain instance (conditions existing and permitting), announcements will be forthcoming the night before on the 10:00 p.m. and 11:00 p.m. news broadcast. In the event that weather conditions necessitate the closing of school during the school day while pupils are at school, the radio stations will be alerted and will broadcast dismissal times. This will alert the parents to the fact that students will be taken home. In the event that extreme and/ or adverse weather conditions occur after the children have been delivered to their respective schools and these conditions necessitate the closing of school, the closing will take place as soon as the bus drivers return to the school and the parents have been alerted via the radio stations. In the event that the schools are closed for severe weather conditions, all regularly scheduled athletic events, extra curricular activities, and activities involving the use of the school occuring on that day will be automatically cancelled.

TIRE, FRIEND OR FOE

Fire can be a friend or enemy and plays no favorites. In 1970 destructive fires took a toll of an estimated 12, 200 lives and \$2.6 billion in property in the United States. Fire fatalities rose by 100 over the previous year, according to the National Fire Protection Association.

Building fires were the big onsumer of dollars with losses of \$2.4 billion. Dwelling fires were responsible for over half of the human lives lost and approximately one-fourth of the victims of home fires were children.

Each day, on the average, he cost of fires in residential property is 18 lives lost, 1738 homes and apartments damaged or desroyed and over \$2 million lost.

Reports indicate the nation is naking small but significant progress in lowering the fire loss probem. With a continually increasing opulation, the number of fire deaths per thousand persons has decreased lightly in a majority of states. How-

lever, with the inflation spiral, the cost of fire per capita continues to climb, rising from over \$8 per peron in 1960 to almost \$13 last year.

What can be done about this ire problem? Each of us must start our personal fire prevention program in our homes and on our farms. A good beginning is inspection of our buildings. According to a NFPA study, the principle causes of building fires are: (1) defective or misused electrical wiring and equipment; (2) defective or overheated heating and cooking equipment; and (3) careless use of smoking materials. Together, these three causes accounted for 39

percent of all building fires last year. Second, we should plan what o do in case of fire. Every member of the family should know at least two ways to get out of a room or building. This training should include even the youngest children. All exits should be kept clear. Fire department phone numbers should be posted at each phone. In two-story buildings, a rope ladder or similar device should be kept on hand, and an alarm system should be set up.

Most fires are caused by carelessness -- don't let your friendly fire become a foe by your careless-



October 14, 197 MICHIGAN SHERIFFS ASSOCIATION

The President of the Michigan Sheriffs' Association, Ronald Parsons has condemned House Bill 5464 and Senate Bill 1036, as designed to unermine and destroy County Govern-

ment in Michigan. Parsons, who is Sheriff of Kent County said that the passage of these two bills, would remove control of County government from county citizens and would place control of county government in the hands of a few men who cannot be representative of all of the people.

Both House and Senate Bills will be debated at a public hearing October 13 in the Supreme Court Chambers at the State Capitol at 10:00 a.m.

Sheriff Parsons maintains that Senate Bill 1036, must be looked upon as subterfuge designed to weaken the citizens inalienable right to govern themselves and to lessen law enforcement to the point of paralysis, and said Parsons, "House Bill 5464 is a little better."

The Michigan Sheriffs' Association, which is made up of the Sheriffs in the majority of the counties of Michigan, have gone on record as unanimous ly being opposed to both House and Senate Bills and have proclaimed that it will do everything in its power "to defeat these two bills which are totally antiethical to good ethics, good sense and honest well organized government of the people and by the people."






