Louis Jolliet, the explorer, and Father Jacques Marquette, the Jesuit missionary to the Indians, left St. Ignace May 17, 1673, on a search for a waterway to the Pacific.

Accompanied by their voyageurs, the party traveled by way of lakes and rivers until it reached the Mississippi. When they entered the great river, Jolliet and Marquette were elated to have found at last the stream which they had so long hoped to see.

Then the travelers, floating down the Mississippi, eventually reached the mouth of the Arkansas River, they became convinced the river emptied into the Gulf of Mexico.

Ill health plagued Father Marquette on the return trip. He died, only 38 years old, before reaching his beloved mission at St. Ignace.

Special Election

For the first time in the history of Washtenaw County voters will have an opportunity to vote on a proposition specifically intended for moderately and severely mentally retarded and multiply handicapped school age child ren. On November 30th at a special county wide election a proposition will be presented to the voters which if passed will permit the building of a Mental Retardation Service Center.

A specific place of their own for the mentally retarded would be another first in the history of Washtenaw County, because these mentally retarded children have always been in someone else's buildings such as churches or vacated schools and these have never been adequate for their program and service needs.

The proposed Center will be able to serve over 200 children daily and another 200-300 children from the county can receive needed diagnostic and assessment services. The responsibility for building and directing this Center will rest with the Washtenaw Intermediate School District.

The cost of constructing, equipping and furnishing the proposed Center is \$2,700,000. A bonding program for this sum would mean a tax increase of . 19 mill or 19¢ per \$1,000 assessed evaluation. The additional annual cost to a family with a home with a market value of \$25,000 and assessed at \$12,500 would be \$2.37 1/2 for only twelve years or a total of \$28.50. The proposition on the November

30th ballot asks permission for the Washtenaw Intermediate School District to borrow the money to build a place for the moderately and severely mentally retarded children of Wash-

tenaw County.
