Florence "Grandma" Kirk Been On Call for 25 Years

In this 20th Century, the age of technology, with automated, computerized services, the impersonal life of the numbered Americans, cautioned in every way not to fold, spindle, or mutilate, there are none the less, warm, compassionate, responsible, and dependable services being performed in a very human way.

Such a service is the ringing of the fire whistle by Florence J. (Grand-

Since December 1, 1956, for twenty five years, twenty four hours a day, Grandma has been on call for the fire department.

In the early days she would perhaps receive 2 calls per month, but as the years went by and there were an increasing number of people using the number to call for any emergency, the calls were often for the police department as well. Some Sunday mornings were sleepy ones after having answered the phone fifteen times on a

Saturday night. Living in her apartment above the L. V. Kirk Appliance store, Grandma has a special phone upstairs as well as down. When a call comes in, she must cope with sometimes frightened or hysterical people and even has had to pry the proper information cut of them. Once the names, addresses. etc. are obtained, then she reaches for her special button, and the fire whistle rouses the volunteer fire department who come flying from all directions, out of stores and out of homes, and within minutes the trucks are on their

How many hundreds of times have we all heard the noon whistle, never giving a thought to the dedication involved in this simple chore. Many towns have experimented with automatic timers, and have had false fire alarms, which can be very expensive as well as discouraging. Manchester, for twenty five years, has had a 12 o'clock timer in the person of Grand

Amusing and tragic, the phone can bring anything. Some years ago Grandma answered a call and heard only a woman's voice mumbling, in great pain she could not speak, but Grandma recognized the voice, for

fifty years earlier she had been a neighbor near the farm, and so she

> alone on the floor with a broken hip. Son Leonard had a similar experience when he received a call from a stuttering man at Pleasant Lake. Having trouble getting information he kept repeating that he must have the name and address and was told "Stop your damn questions and send the fire truck" then hung up. However, once again Chick knew the voice and was able to give the right address.

At one time, with a fire in progress, the Ann Arbor Department received a call from this area with only the name of the street given, and to further complicate matters, Saline, Milan and Manchester all had to answer because without an address each had to search a part of the district to

Receiving a call from Ann Arbor one day that a woman had just remembered she shut and locked her door and left dinner on the stove cooking, the time involved in trying to get a key was too great, so Chick simply went out and tossed a stone through the window, climbed in and turned off the

To be ninety years old on the 20th of February, Grandma Kirk was born in 1882 in the Irish Hills. Daughter of the original settlers, she married Ferdinand Kirk in 1906 and moved to Grossman Rd. in Manchester Twp., living on what is now the Marvin Kirk farm. Six children were born of them, Sr. Jean Mildred, Sr. Vincent Marie, Robert, Marvin, Mildred, and Leonard.

In 1946 Ferdinand died and Grandma moved to town where she has since made her home. "Grandma" to the whole town, this reporter had to ask

her name, never having heard it before. Just a tiny mite, but with a straight back and firm will, sharp and alert, Grandma can still be seen working in the store and sometimes walking to Church. The best of our Pioneer heritage stands firm and solid, steady and dependable. Merry Christmas Grandma from everyone of us.
