



The community owes these people, as well as all who have given their blood that their neighbors may be safe in time of need, a debt of gratitude. 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

READING SHOULD CHALLENGE GRADE-SCHOOL CHILDREN

When your child is tired of playing, encourage him to read a book geared to his interest level. Your children's librarian should be able to

suggest many. Sharing a book can be an exciting experience for both of you, says Helen Fairman, home economist from Washtenaw County.

Some of the classics capture a child's imagination, bringing new interests and experiences into his world. What boy or girl could pass up the suspense in Robinson Crusoe or a trip to o Treasure Island? Fascinate them with the adventures of the Swiss Family Robinson, or let them relive the

Oklahoma land rush in Cimatron. Magazines, periodicals and newspapers can also make interesting reading for a volumetter, Mrs. Fairman

But providing your child with good literature isn't the complete answer, according to Helen Fairman. Let him sit alone in a comfortable, quiet, well-lighted spot with few distractions. Ask him about the book as he finishes, or read it yourself. If you find yourself reliving your own chilchood, by all means show your excitement. As your child catches your erthusiasm, his reading appetite can only increase.

Helen Fairman suggests a test to determine what books your child might understand. Pick out a hundred words on any page and ask him to read them aloud. If he misses more than five, the book is too hard. Two or three words missed indicates the book

THE MANCHESTER ENTERPRISE 1972 SET-ASIDE PROGRAM

In spite of zero temperatures and frigid winds, farmers are already making plans for the 1972 crop year. Nick Smith, Chairman of the Michigan State ASC Committee, says that

the government's goal is to divert 38 million acres of cropland from production. This will be known to the farmer as set-aside acreage, for which he will receive a payment of 80¢ a bushel for grain sorghum and 64c a bushel for barley on the farm yield multiplied by the qualified acreage set-aside. Smith points out that the set-aside acreage must be cropland that would normally grow the crop for which payment is made. These acreages must be either whole fields or subdivisions of not less than four acres unless a smaller acreage

is needed to meet the balance of setaside or to meet the total set-aside reocirement. Some areas at road intersections that promote safety will also be accepted. The set-aside acreage may not be cropped during 1972 except that that grazing is permitted after September 1 or a fall crop may be planted for harvest in a subsequent year.

The minimum acreage requirement to be eligible for the 1972 feed grain program is 25% of the feed grain base. Additional acreages up to 10% of the base may be set aside at a higher payment rate. Smith points out that the rate for additional set-aside will not be announced until after January

The enrollment period for the 1972 feed grain and wheat program is February 3 thru March 10. The final certification date for crops and designation of set-aside acreage is June 30,

# MICHIGAN FARM BUREAI

Once again attempts are being made to sucker the United States into international commodity agreements in spite of the complete failure of these schemes.

An official of the European Common Market, Pierre Malve, the Common Market's economic counselor Washington D.C., says that such agree ments are the only way that the Common Market and the U.S. could settle their many agricultural trade differ-

Malve proposes a series of international farm commodity pacts on a number of products ranging from grains to dairy products. He suggests price floors, limits on national grice supports, indirect production commols and export subsidies.

Too many U.S. formers remembershe disestrous effects of the 1967 International Wiseat Agreement which contributed to a drop in experts and saw july wheat futures plunge to a 25-year low of \$1.25 per bushel in June, 1968, on the Chicago Board of

It also will be remembered that many of the European signers of the Wheat Agreement failed to abide by the minimum price schedule and in July, 1969, the agreement for all practical purposes was in a state of total collapse.

When the 1967 agreement expired on June 30, 1971, a new International Wheat Agreement was signed by the U.S. and other participating governments, but it did not contain maximum and minimum prices, nor other price provisions.

lt did, however, provide a framework for subsequent price negotiations when these may be desirable and in the interest of the U.S.

The proposal of the Common Market official that the U. S. enter into a price-fixing scheme for farm commodities is interesting in view of a companion statement by the same official that the Common Market "cannot renounce" import levies.

The trial balloon sent up by the Common Market comes as current trade negotiations begin in Brussels between the U.S., the Common Market, Japan and Canada.

MICHIGAN SNOWMOBILERS RECEIVE WARM QUEBEC WELCOME

A caravan of twenty Michigan snowmobilers led by Commander Wm. Gallagher of Fenton, received the "Key to Kipewa" last week, presented by Mayor Paul Benoit of Temiskaming,

On hand were Provincial Member of Parliament Dr. Theberge, President of the Chamber of Commerce P.R. Bucher, and Chief of Game Wardens for the area Mr. Gerry Barbe, and other civic leaders, to greet the first winter group of tourists into this normally quiet resort area.

Gallagher, who planned the series of expeditions on snowmobile into the Quebec wilderness earlier, drew much criticism from the Ontario Wolf League and abandoned Wolf

Hunting as the main objective. Temperatures reached 52 below zero at the destination camp, approximately 50 miles in the interior, however, Gallagher states, modern snowmobile clothing, along with face masks and helmets, provided very adequate protection. Oil was difficult to mix with gasoline at these temperatures and required warming. Mitts kept hands comfortable, as fingered gloves were abandoned. The problem of cold feet was solved with the application of foot powder, which prevented foot moisture.

In spite of the extreme cold, the group encountered several areas

of 8" slush under the snow on various lakes which stopped the machines.

This became a problem of hard pushing and pulling with tow ropes until a simple solution was found -- the lifting of the front of the skis by a person on each side while the driver could then walk his machine out with normal

A few hunters, who, with the advice of quebec Land and Forest Department, attempted to stalk wolves on snow shoes, discovered the wolf to be the very clever and crafty target, and not easily seen, although his tracks were predominate in the forests and surrounding lakes. There were no deer tracks and very few moose, states Gallagher.

Out post camp owner, Bob Denault broke trail through the 3 ft. powder snow and by map let the Safari on a 100 mile exploration ride. Gasoline was flown into the area by ski equipted aircraft and special "fuel drops" along the trek made carrying of fuel unnecessary. The average snowmobile, according to Gallagher, with six gallon tanks, has a range of approximately 50 miles. Emergency fuel can be carried in quart plastic containers under the hood. The group found snowshoe rabbit hunting and trapping very productive and a farewell meal of rabbit stew was a cold weather gourmets delight.

The expedition returned after four days in the bush with only minor breakdowns. Two machines lost a front ski each, but Mike Burnash of Flint, and Jeff Tobian of Toledo, Ohio, drove their snowmobiles 50 miles back with no problems on one

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
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

'Herr Field Marshal," he called, "The officials who failed to call interference apologized."


