



If your typical work week runs five days, a total of 40 hours, it may interest you to know that you worked from Monday morning until about 2 p.m. Tuesday just to pay the direct taxes you owe to federal, state and local government.

According to the Tax Foundation, it takes 13 hours, 5 minutes worth of your weekly pay for taxes. That doesn't include many hidden taxes in the things

By contrast, about 5 hours, 15 ninutes of your work week earned the money to buy groceries.

Keeping a roof over your head-that is, all housing costs -- adds up to about 5 hours, 5 minutes worth of work time. Total expenses for automobiles, bus fare or any other transportation takes about 3 hours, 10 minutes of the

It takes about 2 hours, 5 minutes to earn money for the clothing store. Doctors, dentists and other medical expenses add up to just under 2 hours worth of work each week.

Recreation expenses account for about an hour and 35 minutes of your time on the job.

That leaves about 7 hours and 50 minutes -- not quite a full day's work -to pay other expenses. You know -- a new chair for the living room, your son's college tuition, your wife's trip to the bearty shop, contributions to the church and a myriad of other expenses necessary to keep a family running.

Of course, there's no such thing as an "average" or "typical" family. But if you're a 40 hour, five-day-aweek worker, these statistics mean something to you.

Batik is a Javanese word for a method of applying designs to fabric. It requires the use of wax and fabric dye, fabric, a brush and a little time. The results of batik design on fabric are lovely and often unusual. A finished batik has many uses. Wear it as a scarf make it into a pillow, an apron, a blouse, or frame it. When making a batik, melt ed wax is painted onto fabric

When the wax hardens, the fabric is dipped into a dye solution. The waxed areas re sist the dye so that dye is absorbed only on the unwaxe portions. Waxing and dyeing is repeated several times to obtain the final, colorful de sign. The crackled, cobweb effect so characteristic of batik through cracks in the wax Wax is removed on a finished batik by ironing fabric placed between layers of absorbent

paper.


